At present, however, the worthless metal scattered over the ground effectively deters car owners. A county truck will be used in the cleanup, Grubb said, and will be followed by magnetic raking as soon as equipment can be had.

Blue stamps, G, H, and J, totaling 48 points, in war ration book two will become valid for the purchase of processed foods beginning Saturday, and will be good throughout the month of May, the OPA announced today. Blue stamps D, E, and F, which have been in use since March 25, expire on April 30. This means that blue stamps D, E, F, (the April series), and G, H, J, (the May series), all will be valid for the one week beginning April 24 to the end of the month. A similar "overlap period" was provided toward the end of last month, when the D, E, and F blue stamps for April were validated on March 25. The purpose of the overlap period is to make it easier for housewives to shop toward the end of the month when their family books may lack a sufficient number of ration points to buy an item they need. The new stamps, G, H, and J, it was pointed out, are on the page opposite the one which consumers are now using, with stamps lettered G forming the outside right-hand row of the ration book page. This arrangement it was explained, makes it easy to remove stamps in their alphabetical order. The letter "I" has been omitted from the series because of its possible confusion with numeral "one." In validating stamps on a new page in the ration book, OPA again cautioned housewives about the need for care in tearing out stamps. "Be sure you are removing stamps from only a single page," is the advice of OPA, "since it's easy to mistakenly tear out the

stamps from two pages that stick together." Consumers are reminded that the retailer may not legally accept loose stamps. Stamps that are torn from ration books can be easily lost.
