

Elks Beat Fliers 11 to 4 on Hits And Many Errors

Houtchens Easy Master Of Visiting Nine as Bend Pounds Ball Hard

The Bend Elks baseball team let loose with its weekly barrage of hits yesterday afternoon to down the Redmond air base team on the Bend diamond by a score of 11 to 4.

Twelve hits by the Elks, plus five errors by the airmen, who go by the name of Rattlers, sent the Bend players around the bases 11 times. Playing nearly errorless ball the Elks gave the airmen only four runs from their nine hits, scattered by Pitcher Bob Houtchens through six innings.

Teams Score Early
Each of the teams got four hits and three runs in the first inning, went hitless and scoreless in the second inning and Bend fans were all set to see their first "tight" ball game of the year. The Elks broke the tie in the third, however, when Douglas and Gordon crossed the plate. The Rattlers countered with a run in the fifth inning to make it 5-4 for the Elks, then the Bend batsmen scored a run in their half of the fifth and added five more in the sixth to finish the scoring for the day.

Striking out 10 batters and yielding nine scattered hits, Houtchens got credit for his second victory of the season. Not a one of the airmen was walked by Houtchens. Davis, of the airmen, struck out four Elks and gave five of them free trips to first base.

Douglas, Roberts Hit
Bob Douglas and Bob Roberts led Bend batters, Douglas getting three hits and three runs in three trips to the plate and Robert four hits and two runs in five times at bat.

The victory was the third in as many weeks for the Elks, who defeated Klamath Falls and Camp Abbot on the two previous Sundays.

Swedish Racer Wins From Rice

New York, June 21 (AP)—Gaunt Gunder Hagg, the Swedish sky-rocker whose running prowess attracted international attention even in a world ablaze with war, was off to a flying start today in his invasion of America's cinder-paths.

The long-haired Scandinavian thrilled 19,000 fans when he made his American debut at Triborough stadium yesterday by running this nation's best into the hard, gray cinders to win the 5,000-meter National A. A. U. championship. Despite a headache and lack of training after a 26-day voyage to this country aboard an oil tanker, Hagg broke the tape 40 yards ahead of little Gregory Rice in the good time of 14:48.5.

Crowd Is Pleased
Hogg's victory was the crowd-pleasing feature of the day, which saw hurrying Hal Davis of the University of California, and Bill Cummins, Rice Institute, turn in double victories, and Ensign Cornelius Waterman of the Del Monte, Cal., pre-flight school, only man ever the clear 15 feet in the pole vault, make this height for the 37th time in a successful title defense.

Davis, current world's fastest human, speed to a new world record of 20.2 in capturing the 200-meter dash. But officials ruled the mark out because of a following wind. The old mark of 20.3, set in 1935 by Jesse Owens, stands. He also equalled the meet record of 10.3 in defending the 100-meter crown.

Rice Wins Hurdles
Rice, the N. C. A. A. and southwest conference hurdles king, roared to a 14.3 victory in the 110-meter hurdles and followed with a 22.8 triumph in the 200-meter hurdles.

Other defending champions were Billy Brown, former Louisiana State star, with a 45 foot, five inch mark in the hop, step and jump; Cliff Bourland, University of Southern California, who retained the 400-meter title in 47.7 seconds; and Frank Berst, New York A. C., with a 35 foot, two inch 53-pound weight performance.

Greenberg Wins Tennis Tourney

Detroit, June 21 (AP)—Seymour Greenberg, Chicago, held the national clay courts tennis championship for the second successive time today following his triumph over William Talbert of Cincinnati, 6-1, 4-6, 6-3, 6-3.

Bob Kimbrough and Earl Cocheil, both of Los Angeles, defeated Greenberg and Talbert for the doubles championship, 1-6, 6-3, 6-4, 6-2.

Pauline Betsz, women's singles champion from Los Angeles, teamed with Nancy Corbett of Chicago to win the women's double championship with a 6-3, 6-3 victory over Mary Hernandez and Mildred Sirwaitis of Detroit.

San Francisco, June 21 (AP)—August "Gussie" Suhr, the San Francisco Seals' first baseman, is just a hometown boy who has come back to his favorite club after a highly successful major league career and today can be regarded as just about the most popular player of local fans.

Suhr, 37 years old and with a record of nearly 11 years in the majors with Pittsburgh and Philadelphia in the National league, returned to San Francisco this season to prove to baseball fans that his skill at first base hasn't faded a bit.

As a native San Franciscan, born the year of the great earthquake, Suhr has a natural attachment for his hometown ball club. He has remarked that "I'd rather play with the Seals than with a major league club," and means it.

Pro Teams Fight Over Schedules

Chicago, June 21 (AP)—A bitter internal battle over the 1943 schedule plans threw the National football league meeting into a hopeless deadlock early today and forced the extension of the session for another day.

After a continuous 16-hour session devoted principally to mapping the schedule, the pro grid moguls finally abandoned the futile task and agreed to reconvene today.

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Stanky Is Goat As Cards Beat Chicago's Cubs

Freshman Player Yields Two Classic Boots as St. Louis Wins 10 to 9

New York, June 21 (AP)—The Chicago Cubs made Second Baseman Eddie Stanky sleep in an upper berth as the club headed for Boston today after splitting a curious doubleheader with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Stanky's relations with the Cub management were strained almost beyond repair when the freshman second baseman contributed three classic boots in the eighth inning as the Cardinals turned three hits into six runs to win the opener, 10-9. Max Lander, fifth in a parade of six Cardinal pitchers, escaped with the tainted victory.

Cubs Victors
The afterpiece went only five innings, the Cubs winning, 2-1, when the game was called. Bill Nicholson, Cub outfielder, highlighted the afternoon with two home runs.

The Philadelphia Phillies came roaring back from the second division with a pair of victories over the Boston Braves, 13-7 and 7-0.

The Brooklyn Dodgers cut the Cardinal lead to two and a half games by beating the New York Giants, 8-7, in the day's only single game. Curt Davis finally won the pitching decision over Ace Adams after nine hurlers made brief appearances.

The Pittsburgh Pirates knocked the Cincinnati Reds from third place to fifth by sweeping both ends of the bargain bill, 5-4 and 4-2.

The New York Yankees maintained their three-game lead over the Washington Senators in the American league by splitting with the Senators, losing the first, 5-3, and coming back to annex the second, 7-6.

Browns Beat Detroit
The St. Louis Browns took a long step toward curing themselves from their disastrous eastern swing by dumping Detroit twice, 6-3 and 5-4.

The Chicago White Sox slipped into a tie for last place with the Browns by dividing with Cleveland, winning the first, 10-6, and losing the finale, 7-2.

Jim Tabor's two home runs and Bobby Doerr's single four-base shot started the Boston Red Sox on the way to a twin victory over the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-3 and 6-5.

Center of Big Nazi City Said To Be in Ruins

London, June 21 (AP)—RAF bombardment of the great German industrial city of Dusseldorf has devastated more than 1,000 acres in the heart of the Nazi war production center and the total may be 1,500 acres, the air ministry news service said today.

The RAF term "devastated" means more than 65 per cent destroyed. Dusseldorf has been hit by three great RAF night attacks. "This is the most shattering blow of the German war so far struck in the battle of the Ruhr valley," the news service said.
