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Oregon's Coal To Have Part in War Industry

Federal Agencies Will Explore Possibilities Along Western Coast

By Janet Gould (United Press Staff Correspondent) Portland, June 21 (UP)—Cooos county coal was coming into its own today, destined to fill pressing fuel needs of the northwest and set the trend for Oregon's expanding post-war industries. The change in emphasis from metallic to non-metallic and light alloy production in Oregon after the war hinged to an extent on availability of several hundred tons per day of coal, Earl K. Nixon, director of the state department of geology, predicted. Feasibility of a much-discussed Alumina plant to treat Willamette valley clays, possible manufacture of sponge iron or "melting stock" depends on Cooos bay coal, he said.

Significance Stressed In addition to alleviating a present and critical shortage of fuel for cantonments, homes and war plants of Oregon and Washington, production of coal—after a lull of 40 years—would help increase size of mining operations, changing Oregon's mineral industry from a small man's game to one substantially larger.

The federal government announced Saturday it was prepared to spend \$100,000 exploring Cooos bay coal. The state and county matched funds totaling \$40,000 toward a program under way and sponsored by the state geology department.

Already, Nixon said, favorable results had been indicated in the state's short-range work in exploring shallow deposits of the mineral. When federal monies are released the U. S. bureau of mines, with cooperation of the department here, will engage in a longer-term program consisting largely of diamond drilling.

New Order Seen An advantage of the present state-county work, Nixon said, was its obviating necessity for importing experienced underground miners.

To date war had wrought definite changes in northwest mining, the director said.

"The old order of importance in Oregon was gold, silver, copper, zinc, lead and quicksilver."

"The new order of things includes quicksilver, chromite, aluminum, manganese, zinc, with platinum and coal increasing."

"Of these four—aluminum, magnesium, chromite and quicksilver—are expected to be the largest in the public scheme of things for the next few years," Nixon declared.

Oregon's upswing in production of chromite, a leading light metal alloy, started early in 1942 with creation of state and federal government purchasing stockpiles at Coquille, Seneca and Grants Pass. Drilling sponsored by the department in 1940 was largely responsible for developing the so-called black chromite sands of coast areas.

Big Plant Operating Two primary concentrators and a finishing plant are now operating in the Cooos bay district. Nearly \$2,000,000 had been spent on chrome production there, Nixon said, and the federal government had roughly a \$1,000,000 equity in the county's chrome enterprise.

The department prediction of new postwar industries was based on present trends.

Oregon clays might make fire bricks and other refractories for lining metallurgical furnaces, Nixon said. Demands for soda ash, chlorine and other common industrial chemicals might pre-empt commercial development of Oregon salt lake deposits.

Soil deficiencies, at present threatening the state's food production capacity, could make possible the use of Oregon's borate pits, now idle for 50 years.

"Captor" and "Prisoner" On Duty Here

A Medical Administrative Corps officer taken prisoner during the Tennessee maneuvers last year and one of his captors, a Medical Corps officer, encountered one another for the second time recently—at the Station Hospital at Camp Abbot.

In the fall of 1942, a medical unit consisting of eight ambulances and 64 men in charge of Lt. Edwin Ramsey of the Medical Administrative Corps was halted and captured by an "enemy" armored battalion which had parked beside a Tennessee road during a blackout. Attached to the battalion was Lt. Joseph J. Tuby of the Medical Corps. Both officers are now assigned to Camp Abbot, Lieutenant Ramsey as commander of a new detachment at the hospital and Lieutenant Tuby as one of the hospital's medical officers.

Lieutenant Ramsey was transferred to Service Command Unit 1973 from a motorized division with which he served during the Tennessee maneuvers and maneuvers in the Arizona desert. He entered the army as an enlisted man and received his commission in 1942.

Camp Salvages Tin Cans, Glass, Grease, Crates

Tons of material for the war effort are gathered every week in Camp Abbot, according to Capt. J. C. Burgess, QM repair shop officer.

Salvaging of tin cans is playing a big role in the program. Broken glass also is carefully saved. Literally, a "mountain of glass" rises in rear of Bldg. 325 and like other conservation items, is sold to civilian contractors. Even wads of paper, rescued from Abbot waste baskets and cardboard from mess hall supply boxes are salvaged. Egg and vegetable crates also are sorted.

Nearly 100 pounds of cooked grease are obtained daily from the mess halls and used to aid in the manufacture of ammunition.

Capt. Burgess, one of the pioneer officers stationed at Abbot, emphasized that "nothing is overlooked in camp that can be salvaged, clearly demonstrating that conservation is a 'must' project."
