

League All Stars Meet in Summer Classic Tonight

Crowd of 33,000 Will See Featured Contest in Philadelphia Park

Philadelphia, July 13 (UP)—Baseball's mid-summer classic, the annual all-star game between the National and American leagues, will be staged in Philadelphia for the first time tonight with big Mort Cooper again opening on the mound for the Nationals.

Though many luminaries who shown brilliantly during the 10 previous "dream games" are now in service, the rival squads are so evenly matched with those remaining that a capacity crowd of 33,000 is expected in Shibe park when Cooper attempts to avenge last year's defeat.

Cooper, Brawny, black-haired right-hander of the St. Louis Cardinals, was starting pitcher for the Nationals at New York last July when first-inning home runs by Lou Boudreau and Rudy York resulted in a 3-1 American league victory.

Cooper Is Choice

Billy Southworth of the champion Cardinals, manager of the 1943 National squad, announced Cooper as his choice to open this first all-star night game in which the National leaguers seek to improve their record of three victories against seven defeats. Betting is at even-money on the outcome.

Joe McCarthy of the Yanks, pilot of the junior circuit squad, was unable—as yet—to announce his starting moundman, but his choice also was expected to be a right-hander—either big Ernie Bonham of the Yanks of Tex Hughson of the Red Sox. McCarthy, who arrived late yesterday, said he must go into a huddle about Bonham, who had complained of a knee ailment while the Yanks were in Chicago.

Southworth announced the starting National lineup that would take the field if McCarthy opened with a right-hander. McCarthy drew up a vague batting order in which only five men definitely were slated to perform.

Lineups Given

Southworth's lineup includes five Cardinals—Stan Musial, lf; Walker Cooper, cf; Slats Manton, ss, and Mort Cooper on the mound. Stan Hack, third baseman of the Cubs, is lead-off man, followed by second-basemen Billy Herman of the Dodgers, Musial bats next, followed by Bill Nicholson, rf, of the Cubs, and Elbie Fletcher, lb, of the Pirates.

McCarthy's tentative American lineup has George Case of the Senators as lead-off man, playing left or right field. He will be followed by Ken Keltner of Cleveland, 3b; Jeff Heath of Cleveland or Dick Wakefield of Detroit, rf or lf; Vernon Stephens of St. Louis, ss; Rudy York, Detroit, 1b; Chet Laabs, St. Louis, cf; Bill Dickey, Yanks, or Buddy Rosar, Cleveland, or Jake Early, Washington, c; and Joe Gordon, Yanks, or Bobby Doerr, Boston, 2b.

Inning Limit Set

Each pitcher can hurl only three innings. Thus, McCarthy is expected to use two right-handers and sandwich in a southpaw between them—probably Hal Newhouser of the Tigers.

Southworth's National league pitching was weakened when southpaw Howie Pollet of the Cards departed yesterday to report at St. Louis for an army examination. Ace Adams of the Giants, originally the squad's batting practice pitcher, was designated to fill Pollet's vacancy.

San Francisco, July 13 (UP)—Two Swedes ran through the weeds at the Lakeside Country club pursued not by a couple of Norwegians but by portly Charley Hunter, athletic director of the San Francisco Olympic club, and most of the local sports writing fraternity.

When the smoke had cleared away from 3,000,000 words of English and Swedish—intermittently angry, pleading and cajoling—Gunder Hagg, greatest distance runner in history, had agreed to run a mile instead of two miles at Kezar stadium next Saturday.

Sigfried Steinwall, the great man's trainer, held his head in his hands at the announcement, assuring the assemblage that Hagg undoubtedly would get the pants beaten off him by Gil Dodds, the bespectacled divinity student from old Boston.

Hagg, his palate soothed by the most luscious filet mignon these eyes have seen for many moons, asserted he would do his best against Dodds but held only slight hopes of going under 4:10 for the four laps.

"I don't care if you take 15 minutes," joyfully shouted Charley Hunter. "We have been under the impression you wanted to run the mile here—and that's what it's got to be. Remember the gate receipts!"

Hagg of Sweden Agrees to Run Mile With Dodds

San Francisco, July 13 (UP)—

Gloomily predicting that his reputation as the world's greatest distance runner was in jeopardy, Gunder Hagg of Sweden today began workouts at the Lakeside Country club for his mile race Saturday against Gil Dodds, Boston Divinity student.

"I'm not yet in condition to run a satisfactory mile," Hagg declared. "But I have been told that the people of San Francisco are expecting me to run the mile and that they may not support the meet if I run two miles as I did in Chicago and Los Angeles."

"I will run the mile solely because I do not wish to see the army air forces benefit fund hampered, although I know I am jeopardizing my reputation as a runner."

Hagg's decision to compete in the four-lap event came only after two hours of arguing with officials of the San Francisco Olympic club, which is sponsoring the meet.

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Garrison and Ramirez Draw

Portland, July 13 (UP)—Rodolfo Ramirez, Mexican welterweight champion, fought to a 15-round draw with Kansas City's Jimmy Garrison here last night as 7,000 fans booed their disapproval.

On various score cards Ramirez was credited with from eight to 10 rounds in the bout, the first long distance match here since the turn of the century.

After an even first round, the Mexican, his left hand creasing Garrison's chin regularly, rolled to an edge in the second. The Kansas City veteran came back to cop the third by a shade, but Ramirez outpunched his shorter and heavier rival in the fourth and fifth.

Garrison Takes Sixth

In Garrison's best round, the sixth, he had Ramirez temporarily in trouble with a stiff right and bounced him from post to post throughout the frame. Ramirez, however, had Garrison stumbling in the seventh and out-boxed and outpunched him in the eighth. The ninth was even and the Mexican came back to shade Garrison in the 10th and 11th. Garrison had a slight edge in the 12th, but in the last three rounds he was the victim of continuous duries that left him rubber-legged when Referee Ralph Gruman raised his arm with Ramirez.

No Run, No Hit Game Recorded

Honolulu, July 13 (UP)—Walter Masterson, 23, former Senators pitcher and now in the navy, yesterday pitched the first no-hit, no-run game in the Hawaiian league in 15 years, blanking the opposition 3-0.

The league-leading navy club backed Masterson with errorless ball. Only three opposing batters reached first, all on walks.

Deer and Waterfowl Hunters To Suffer From Big Closure

Bend deer hunters lost two of their favorite hunting haunts Saturday when the state game commission voted the entire 10,000 square mile northwest maneuver area closed.

Each fall the Walker mountain country and the large area surrounding the Paulina game refuge have yielded the majority of deer brought into Bend. Each of the areas is close enough to Bend so that A-card holders could have saved enough coupons to make a hunting excursion and build up a point-saving winter's meat supply.

Other areas popular with Bend hunters, but which probably would have been out of A-card range this fall, are the Summer lake rim, the Snow mountain area

near Suplee and the Maury mountain area east of Roberts.

Also included in the hunting closure is Summer lake, mecca for Central Oregon's waterfowl hunters.

The maneuver boundary runs west of Bend and takes in much land between here and near the Cascade summit. This area would have been a good "second choice" for deer hunters, now that they cannot make trips to favored Walker mountain or the Paulina area. The maneuver boundary runs through fairly high country and the open area west of it along the Cascade summit is not regarded as good hunting by local nimrods.

Nearest good deer hunting to Bend will be the Ochoco forest, nearly all of which is open. In general, the area north of Crooked river is outside of the military reservation. The Paisley country south of the maneuver grounds is also a fair prospect. For most hunters, Steens mountain, east of the boundary, will be too far away.

The antelope hunting area is not greatly affected by the closure, since most of the open pronghorn territory lies outside, to the south-east, of the maneuver ground. No hunting country is affected by the closure.

Ordinarily a rather cheerful lot Bend's nimrods were definitely on the "blue" side today.
