

Appling Within Reach of Goal In League Play

Veteran Sets Batting Pace With Five Hits Made In Single Day

New York, Aug. 13 (AP)—Luke Appling, veteran shortstop of the Chicago White Sox, today stood on the threshold of one of the most coveted achievements of veteran baseball players, needing only one solid smash to enter the select circle of those having 2,000 hits.

Appling, already well on the way toward winning the second American league batting title of his career—he topped the loop in 1936 with .338—will, if he connects against the Boston Red Sox, join a clique that includes only seven other active players.

Appling, setting the junior circuit batting pace with .338, slammed out five hits in nine trips yesterday as the White Sox divided with the Red Sox. He collected only one hit in three times as the Red Sox rapped out a 10-3 triumph in the first game.

Gets Two Singles
Appling belted out two singles, a double and a triple in six attempts as Chicago took the finale, 7-6, in 14 innings.

The Indians stretched their current winning string to five games with a 4-3 decision over the Athletics.

Rudy York blasted his 20th and 21st home runs to lead the Tigers to a 10-3 decision over the Senators. The triumph hoisted Detroit into second place.

The Yankees chalked up their first win in three games at St. Louis, handing Buck Newsome his fifth straight loss by belting the Browns, 6-2, in a night game. Nick Etten's double with the bases loaded in the first game the Yankees a 3-0 edge they never lost.

Cooper Wins 16th
In the National league, Mort Cooper won his 16th game as the Cardinals defeated the Giants, 4-1. Manager Mel Ott's 15th homer spoiled Cooper's shutout.

Butch Niekman, Boston Braves rookie, beat the Cubs, 3-2, when he hit a triple in the 12th after Tommy Holmes had singled with two out.

The Dodgers defeated Cincinnati, 3-0, in a twilight game. The triumph put Brooklyn half a game behind the three-place Reds.

The Phillies ran their winning streak to seven by beating the Pirates, 4-3, in a night game that was featured by the ejection of Pittsburgh Pilot Frankie Frisch, Al Rubelling, Bob Klingner and Hank Gornicki for arguing.

Pacific Leaders Win All Games

The first division teams in the Pacific Coast league—Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle and Portland—yesterday continued to sweep their series with lower rung clubs and widen the gap of 52 games between the first place Angels and the lowly Sacramento Solons.

Los Angeles handed the San Diego Padres their third drubbing, 8-4, while Seattle was downing Oakland for the third time, 4-2. San Francisco eked out a second straight win over Sacramento, 6-5, and Portland won its second from Hollywood, 2-1.

The Angels landed hard on starting Padre Pitcher Rex Dillebeck, getting six runs in the first inning on six hits, two walks and two errors.

Sacramento's hard-luck Solons tried hard against the Seals and put on a ding-dong battle for the benefit of 137 customers at the Sacramento park as the lead changed four times. But the tail-enders lost a heartbreaker when with two out in the ninth and Pitcher Bud Byerly nursing a 5-4 lead, the Seals came through with two runs to take the game.

Seattle Beats Oaks

The Seattle Rainiers picked up enough runs to defeat the Oakland A's in the fourth inning of their game in the Bay City, nicking Southpaw Earl Jones for three tallies. A double by Bill Matheson and singles by Ed Carnett and Dick Gyselman highlighted the inning. Pete Jonas was the winning pitcher, scattering nine Oakland hits.

Four-hit pitching by Bill Herring of the Portland Beavers, coupled with a double by Herring and single by Rupe Thompson that scored the winning run, gave the northerners a 2-1 win over Hollywood Stars. Bill Thomas of the Stars allowed eight hits.
