Vice President: E. E. Benedict, Portland, and Ed Laux, Willamina, Ore. Secretary treasurer: Herbert Irving, Aberdeen, and William Killeen, Lake Cowichan, Ore., trustee.

The election will be by referendum of the union's 55,000 members.

Federal Trailer Site About Ready

The federal trailer project at South Fourth street and Roosevelt avenue will open on Monday, final work on the camp having been completed this week.

Miss Signe Peterson, federal public housing agency representative, is in Bend from Seattle making arrangements for the hiring of a staff to operate the 76-unit project.

All of the living trailers are now in their permanent locations. Walks in the camp have been cindered and a large parking lot on fourth street and the access road on Roosevelt avenue from the high way have also been cindered to keep down dust.

The trailer units, which will rent for \$6 a week, will be available to civilian war workers.

"The present occupation of Kiska frees the last vestige of north American territory of Japanese forces.

(Signed) "Franklin D. Roosevelt, W. L. Mackenzie King." Communique issued. A naval communique issued simultaneously in Quebec City and Washington said:

"A task force of the Pacific fleet has landed a force of United States and Canadian troops on Kiska beginning on August 15. No Japanese have been found. There were indications of recent hasty evacuation of the Japanese garrison. Presumably the heavy bombardments by our ships and planes that have been carried on for some time and the danger to their supply lines by our capture of Attu made the enemy positions on Kiska untenable. It is not known how the Japanese got away but it is possible that enemy surface ships were able to reach Kiska under cover of the heavy fog that has been prevalent.

"Since the air and surface bombardments in the latter part of July had apparently destroyed Japanese radio equipment on Kiska the assumption was that they were not in communication with the homeland. Consequently no release of allied operations against Kiska has been made since July 31st as it would have conveyed information to the enemy which he otherwise would not have had.

Earlier reports from the conference between Roosevelt and Prime Minister Winston Churchill had indicated that some action on the Japanese front could be expected. Heavy naval and air action in the Pacific against the Japanese fleet was believed to be one of the major military decisions reached at the conference.

Kristin Hemingway Gets Island Gift

A package from the south sea islands arrived in Bend today addressed to Miss Kristin Hemingway. It was from the little girl's father, Major Max Hemingway, with the American forces in the southwest Pacific theater of war, and contained a native grass skirt, shell necklace and other articles worn by islanders. Previously, Major Hemingway sent his son, Richie, a piece of a wrecked Japanese plane.

Mrs. Hemingway is making her home in Bend while her husband is in the service.

Abbot Soldiers May Get Homes

Camp Abbot, Aug. 21 (Special) Possible relief for Camp Abbot soldiers faced with domestic problems from the shortage of housing facilities near the post was seen today in an announcement by national housing agency officials that henceforth a family would be permitted to occupy war housing if one or more members were civilian war workers, even though the recognized head of the family is a member of the military service. Previously, war housing facilities now under construction in Bend would have been denied families in this category.

Civilian personnel employed at Camp Abbot or military personnel whose wife, son, or daughter is employed in an essential war activity may apply to the personnel division here for war housing application forms. Civilian employment at Camp Abbot is construed to be "essential to war activity."

Completed application forms will be returned to the personnel division which in turn will submit them to war housing officials in Bend for consideration.

Officials pointed out that a family would be eligible for war housing only so long as a member is employed as a civilian worker in an essential war activity.

Boy in Redmond Hurt by Truck

Redmond, Aug. 21—Donald, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Johnson, of near Deschutes, was injured this morning when he was struck and run over by a truck on Sixth street here.

Donald was taken immediately to the Medical-Dental clinic where X-rays revealed that no bones were broken. The boy was bruised severely, however, and is being kept at the clinic for observation. The rear wheel of the truck, reported to have been an army vehicle, passed over the pelvic region of the boy's body.

The driver of the truck, whose name is not available, is reported to have stopped at the scene of the accident and to have fully cooperated with officers in the investigation which followed.

According to local officers, it was the first serious accident to occur in Redmond in over two years.
