

Nazis May Not Be Able to Hold Reds at Dnieper

The increasing speed of the Russian drive from Smolensk to the Black sea makes it seem highly probable the Germans will not be able to hold a line along the Dnieper river, either in the Ukraine or on the central front.

That would mean, in the south, the loss of the entire Ukraine and Crimea, with a retreat to the Bug or Dniester rivers and along the pre-war borders of Poland to the Pripiet marshes. In the north, now that the defenses or Smolensk are crumbling, it would likewise entail a withdrawal to the Polish border.

If such is the case, this winter would see the Germans defending their homeland from positions in eastern Poland, which they overran with such terrifying speed when they attacked Russia in 1940.

Deep Line Prepared
The Germans have prepared a defense in deep outer line of defense and Poland. With the great shortening of their lines which such a withdrawal would entail, they could count on making a stand which they were unable to do, despite their many fortified strong points, east of the Dnieper.

It is inconceivable that the Germans visualized such a retreat except as a last resort, or that they have yet resigned themselves to it. The rapid Russian advance, however, is a sign that this is no longer a planned withdrawal, but is being made at some points with such haste the Germans are suffering unforeseen losses in equipment and material.

The situation for the Germans before the great bend of the Dnieper is as unfavorable as it is in the Smolensk region. The Russians are enveloping Kiev at a distance of about 30 to 40 miles. If it falls, all the territory within the Dnieper bend will be untenable, as well as the region below it down to the Crimea.

800,000 Men in Area
The Germans are estimated to have about 800,000 men in that area. Unless the Russians drive towards the lower Dnieper, unexpectedly halted, these forces will have to be moved soon to escape entrapment.

The Russians are perilously close to Zaporozh and Melitopol, on the main railroad out of the Crimea. If this were the only avenue of escape, the Peninsula probably would have been evacuated by now. However, there is another railroad in the Crimea leading up to Kerekop, on the narrow isthmus connecting it with the mainland. From Perekop the Germans have built a 100-mile extension connecting with the railroad at Kherson, near the mouth of the Dnieper.
