London Times Page One Ads Tell Story of Britain at War

London (P)—Like the good newspaper that it is, "The Times" of London paints a vivid picture of a nation at war on its front page—but "The Times" does it without using a single news item or a solitary picture.

This neat trick is accomplished not with mirrors, but with advertisements—help wanted, personals, legal notices, the announcements of births, deaths, marriages.

Without headlines, bylines, or cut-lines "The Times" front page presents a queer appearance to Americans, used to having their news in eight-column streamers. But the orderly rows of ads tell the story of wartime Britain better than most high-powered staffs of writers could.

Certainly no front-line story of heroism in battle could be more poignant than the simple, dignified notices in the "On Active Service" column, such as:

BRETT JAMES.—In Aug. 1943, killed in action in Sicily, Lieut. John Ivor Brett-James, beloved younger son of Major and Mrs. Norman G. Brett-James, Ridge-way, Elstree, Herts., aged 21.

Just as anywhere else in Britain everybody is trying to buy something he can't get, or sell somebody else something he doesn't want—a tale told abundantly in the "For Sale, Hire and Wanted" columns:

LOW-MILEAGE CARS UP TO 40 H.P. URGENTLY REQUIRED FOR VITAL GOVERNMENT SERVICE. Our inspectors call upon request and pay immediate cash for suitable vehicles at an agreed price.—Newnham, 235-7-9 Hammersmith Road, W. 6.

OFFICER hopeful for a week's shooting shortly would be very grateful if someone would sell him some 12-bore CARTRIDGES, No. 6 shot preferred.—White Box B383, The Times, E.C. 4.

SEVERAL new PAIRS of sheer silk and nylon STOCKINGS (9/4) for sale.—Write best offers, Box W. 1820, The Times, E.C. 4.

WANTED, VICTORIA PRAM.—Must be in good condition.—Write Box 251, The Times, E.C. 4.

WANTED—Urgently, MINCING MACHINE for hen food; condition immaterial if works well.—Cochrane, Woodlands, Tilford, Surrey.

Somebody else will sell an American midwest radio, such as used to cost about 12 dollars at home, for £16, or a mere 64 dollars. Homegrown canary seeds are offered for sale, as is a watch that strikes the hour. Mr. Martin Secker of Buckinghamshire advertises, asking for an Ornamental Paperweight with a snowstorm in a glass ball, and Jacqmar's Shop advertises that they have new issues of their silk scarves, featuring Combined Operations insignia.

Because of Britain's universal conscription there are no calls for vital war-workers, but there are help wanted pleas for practically every other kind of worker, including third Oboe, contra Bass and G Trombone players for The Scottish Orchestra.

The "Appointments and Situations Required" column—meaning Job Wanted—runs to a curious

length in view of the manpower shortages here. Longest of all the columns are those advertising for domestic help.

The "Personal" column runs to lengthy appeals from various charities, but also includes such cryptic messages as:

M. L. B.—Thank you for that knowledge. Design is also fate. It is for you to command and decree.—R. A. D.

And what could be more personal than an aunt:

LET UNIVERSAL AUNTS, LTD. help you: country accommodations found for children, escorts provided, household removals and storage.

Peterson has returned from a conference in Salt Lake City, Utah, with commissioners and directors of agriculture of Washington, Idaho, California, Nevada, Utah and Colorado.

The agriculturists outlined the positions of western farmers in reference to subsidies, local participation, meat and ceiling prices.

Significance Seen
Federal statistics have shown that available feed supplies per animal unit may be 15 per cent less than those of last year, which was not a year of good balance between livestock and feed supplies. Such a situation has particular significance in the west, which markets the greater part of its livestock as feeder stock.

After surveying the unavailability of feed and the situation relative to meat rationing coupons the directors decided there has been a drastic backing up of feeders in the west, with depletion of ranges, improper utilization of scarce feeds and a partial disorganization of the livestock industry.

Therefore, western agriculturists are campaigning for sufficient changes in government policies, prices and regulations to enable the movement of heavy numbers of feeder livestock direct to slaughter.

Reduction Asked
To facilitate the movement, the directors have asked the WFA for a reduction in point values of meat ration coupons, or a temporary suspension such as may be necessary to bring the situation into proper balance. It was pointed out that forces of supply and demand, as conditioned by coupons available, permitted packers to pay less than a full price for feeder animals.

Animals currently at hand cannot be held without a loss in weight, depreciation in quality and a severe drain upon already scarce food supplies.

Is Acute Problem
Peterson said the group told Jones they considered "the milk situation to be one of our most acute agricultural problems."

He said further "it is apparent that milk prices currently being paid throughout the nation justify an increase in prices in the west."

In the southeastern United States, OPA authorized prices at retail from 14 cents in some states to 19 cents in Florida. Agriculture is as interested as anyone in keeping prices within reason. It does object to subsidies as an alternative for fair prices."
