

Stocks Reveal Irregular Drop

New York, Oct. 21.—(UP)—Stocks made an irregular decline today, the first recession in seven sessions. Trading was moderately above yesterday's total.

Market experts attributed the decline purely to technical factors although they held that weakness in some of the oils had a tendency to bring in moderate selling elsewhere.

Weakness in the oil shares followed announcement that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was planning to sell \$25,000,000 of oil stocks to raise funds for the purchase of additional government war bonds to "support the war effort."

Yankees Suffer 6,774 Casualties

Washington, Oct. 21.—(UP)—American elements of the fifth army in Italy suffered 6,774 casualties up to the start of the battle of the Volturno, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson announced today.

These casualties included 879 killed, 3,047 wounded and 2,848 missing.

Stimson called attention to the fact the figure for wounded was lower than the figure of 5,428 wounded which he had reported at his press conference Oct. 7. Subsequent reports from allied headquarters in North Africa had corrected the earlier figure, he said. He warned that casualty reports on current operations were only approximate.

The fifth army, after crossing the Volturno river against stiff resistance and difficult obstacles, now is making "substantial progress in the march toward Rome," he told his weekly press conference.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Oct. 21.—(UP)—One thousand soldiers are to help farmers in the Klamath basin save their potato and onion crops, G. A. Henderson, county agent, said today.

A cold, damp spell enveloped the basin in northern California and southern Oregon causing the emergency harvest which with the aid of the army is expected to be completed in about two weeks.

Farmers will pay the government prevailing wages for the army labor.

Army Still Needs 7,000 Physicians

Washington, Oct. 21.—(UP)—The army and navy urgently need 7,000 more doctors and 800 dentists to insure even minimum care of the wounded through Dec. 31, 1943, the office of war information reported today.

This additional army of doctors would represent a 15 per cent increase in the 46,000 civilian medical men commissioned as of Aug. 15. The OWI hinted that they would be called on to care for casualties in new invasion blows.

Fliers Hit Routes

The northwest African air force already was in action to make the German hold on Rome as difficult as possible. Hitting north of the capital, Flying Fort-

resses knocked out three railroad bridges and battered airfields which would be vital to defense of the city.

Berlin talked somberly about the situation in Russia and Moscow dispatches showed continued successes in the massive drive carrying the red army through the bend of the Dnieper river and bidding to cut off 1,000,000 enemy troops.

Moscow said advance Russian guards already were more than a third of the way across the Dnieper bulge, pushing to within 27 miles of the steel and rail center of Krivoi Rog in an advance of better than six miles.
