Mrs. Rita Mallon, Bend police matron and juvenile officer for over four months, today tendered her resignation to become effective immediately. The action was occasioned, she explained, by the issuance of orders to her husband, Lieut. Emmet J. Mallon, to be prepared for transfer within a few hours. He has been stationed at Camp Abbot.

Mrs. Mallon became the city's only woman police officer last August 13, and has been accredited with accomplishing a considerable reduction in juvenile delinquency here. Chief of Police Ken C. Gulick stated he had not yet decided upon Mrs. Mallon's successor.

DOCTORS GET GRANTS

London (AP)—Honoring the gallant defense of Malta, the Nuffield Foundation has announced grants to provide specialized training in England for six Maltese physicians. Those chosen will be prepared for positions as orthopedic surgeon, radiologist, tuberculosis officer, medical officer for the civil prison and reformatory, and two infant welfare officers. Recipients will receive \$1,600 a year if single, \$2,400 if married, for not more than two years. They will be required to return to Malta after their training.
