Even though citrus marmalades appear on the ration chart, they do not take stamps, the OPA has reminded housewives. For the time being Mrs. America can buy citrus marmalades—that is, if they're made solely from citrus fruits—completely free. However, points are required for non-citrus fruit marmalades or for combinations of these types of fruit with citrus fruits.

Gasoline dealers and distributors are in violation of the OPA mileage rationing regulations if they discriminate against customers in sales of gasoline. As long as a station is open for business and has a supply, the dealer is required to honor valid coupons. However, the dealer may limit the amount of gasoline per customer as long as he gives all customers the same treatment.
