Shriners Initiate Large Bend Class

Shriner delegations numbering about 100 from Portland, 15 from Redmond, and several from Prineville and Madras joined Bend Shriners Saturday in elaborate ceremonial proceedings featuring the initiation of 25 new Shriners, the majority of them Camp Abbot officers and men. Traditional fezzes and brightly colored uniforms identified the large group of Shriners attending.

Heading the Portland delegation was Thomas Luke, Al Kader temple potentate, who was accompanied by his staff and the Shrine band. The group paraded through the streets of Redmond, where they lunched, and toured the Redmond air base before coming to Bend for the main ceremony.

Major in Charge Details of the ceremony, the third ever to be held here, were worked out by Maj. F. O. Brash of Camp Abbot and E. O. Adams of Redmond. Dr. H. C. Staples, Bend rajah, was away from the city but J. R. Roberts, Redmond rajah, attended the ceremony.

Two colorful parades were held Saturday in the afternoon and evening and before the night's main event—initiation in the high school gymnasium—the Redmond delegation and Portland band members dined at the Masonic club rooms and the remainder of the Shriners were served dinner at the Pilot Butte inn.

Post War Plans Topic of Clubmen

Discussion of post-war planning in Deschutes county featured today's weekly noon luncheon meeting of the Bend Kiwanis club at the Pine tavern, with C. G. Reiter, city manager, A. L. Glasgow, representing industry, and C. L. Allen, county judge, making quick analyses of the local situation. The speakers favored accumulation of city, county and school district funds through taxation for after-the-war use, rather than the issuance of bonds at that time and Reiter and Glasgow referred specifically to suggested special levies for such purpose of five mills county, 10 mills city and seven mills Bend school district. The yield in one year from such levies, it was estimated, would total \$139,000.

Allen spoke appreciatively of the manner in which municipal organizations are working together in endeavoring to foresee and prepare for post-war needs, favored a "reservoir of worthwhile projects" under local control.

Reiter approved the prize contest for suggestions to fit the local need, recommended a fine for each Kiwanian who failed to participate in the contest.

Token Rationing To Be Explained

All grocers in this community, and their employees, are urged by Carl E. New ration calendars, to include the changes effected by the token program, will be distributed, Erickson said, and the group will discuss local problems in connection with rationing. The new calendars have been designed for duration use, and will be a special aid to food stores, the official pointed out.

Navy Recruiter Back in Office

Learning that more than 90 per cent of inductees ask for assignment to the navy when they appear at the Portland induction center, Chief O. R. Anderson, in charge of navy recruiting in Central Oregon, returned to Bend from that city today. Anderson had been called to Portland Saturday for a conference, and with other recruiters was shown through the induction center. "We were permitted to hear the navy and army officers question inductees," Chief Anderson stated, "and more than 90 per cent of the men brought in asked for navy service. The chiefs told me that the navy had already oversubscribed its quota of the draftees, and that men desiring to enlist in the navy would have to volunteer if they want that branch of the service."

Chief Anderson is newly assigned to the Bend recruiting station in the Postoffice building.

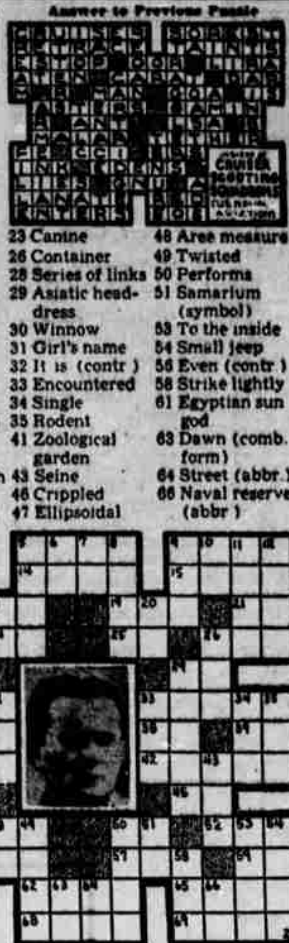

Redmond Outlines Plans for Various Post-War Projects

Redmond, Feb. 21—The city's post-war planning group at its meeting in the city hall Friday evening with representatives from the various city organizations attending, submitted suggestions for post-war projects. The Kiwanis club is interested in beautifying the city, parks and recreation spots being suggested. Legionnaires suggest a new hall, with possible civic center recreation rooms. Schools recommended added rooms for class work as the occasion demands and addition of a music hall for the high school. The chamber of commerce is sponsoring the idea of new city industries and improvement of those already established. The

city suggested, as some of its work, betterment and improvement of streets and mater supply.

The delegates are returning to their groups to discuss ways and means of financing the particular projects. Chairman Fred Hodecker, pointed out that the planning group will report at a called meeting in the near future.

settlement of that debt," Nimitz said in his triumphant communique yesterday noon.

Losses Listed
He listed Japanese losses specifically as follows:

Sunk: Two light cruisers, three destroyers, one ammunition ship, one seaplane tender, two oilers, two gunboats and eight cargo ships.

Probably sunk—One cruiser or large destroyer, two oilers and four cargo ships.

Shot down in combat: 120 planes!

Destroyed on the ground—74 planes; shore installations.

Damaged on the ground—More than 50 planes; airframes.

George Jones, United Press war correspondent who accompanied the task forces in the Truk attack, said in a dispatch sent before the raid that the warships included a number of battleships and added, perhaps significantly:

Thrust Predicted
"We might see our surface strength make a bold thrust into the outer edges of Truk's intricate shorelines for an audacious bombardment . . . aircraft will make the initial assault and they will carry the responsibility of inflicting the initial damage on which surface craft can capitalize."

The attack, carried out under the over-all command of Adm. R. A. Spruance with Rear Adm. M. A. Mitscher, former commander of the USS Hornet, in charge of the carrier raid, neutralized temporarily Japan's biggest naval base outside home waters and prevented the Japanese from sending reinforcements to Eniwetok.
