## Doukhobors Seek New Followers FDR to Veto Huge U. S. Tax Measure

Brilliant, B. C., Feb. 21 (UP)—Doukhobor fanatics spread through the countryside of the Kootenay river area today seeking more recruits in their campaign against the government's draft regulations after nude demonstrations Sunday and exhortations at the tomb of Peter Verigin, their one-time leader.

Half of the 300 "Sons of Freedom" who gathered here yesterday stripped themselves of all clothing but their shoes and stood naked in sub-freezing temperatures for more than 10 minutes. Another 50 extremists disbanded at nearby Ootschemia.

Leaders at a graveside meeting later appealed for additional followers in their defiance of the order prescribing alternative service for draft-age members of the Russian religious sect who refuse to bear arms.

The extremists marched here and at Ootschemia from Thrums, where they held meetings Saturday. It was reported they might go from here to Champion Creek, and police increased guards around bridges and government buildings.

## Women Workers Afraid Service Pins Tell Age

Chicago, (UP)—"Did you get your five-year service pin, Gert?" Not if Gert could help it, judging from a National Metal Trades Assn. study of war workers' reaction to lapel pins recognizing years of faithful duty.

Says the report: "Women employees are inclined to dislike them inasmuch as they feel they are an indication of their ages."

Washington, Feb. 21 (UP)—President Roosevelt in a conference with his "big four" congressional advisers decided today to send a veto of the \$2,315,200,000 tax bill to the house tomorrow.

Speaker Sam Rayburn, one of the conferees, said he was confident the house would not override the chief executive's disapproval. Rayburn told reporters that Mr. Roosevelt planned to send a message on the revenue measure tomorrow, and from other sources it was learned that the president told the conferees the message would be a veto.

By agreement, the house will not consider any controversial legislative matters until Wednesday because of Washington's birthday anniversary. However, it will be in session tomorrow and a veto message could be received.
