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CAP Receives Training Plane

A synthetic training device, the Navy Mark IV navigation trainer has been received by the local Civil Air patrol squadron for the use of training C. A. P. and cadet members in navigation, officers announced last night.

The machine has been assembled in one of the extra rooms of the Bend Flying service building at the Bend airport and trial operations have proved it to be very efficient and in good working order, C. A. P. leaders report.

The Mark IV includes all cockpit instruments and controls of a modern single engine warplane and is equipped with rough air simulations.

In addition to the Mark IV, a 16 mm. movie projector, complete with sound equipment and screen has recently been received through the C. A. P. headquarters in Portland. The projector was put into use at last night's cadet meeting and three training film's, "Glider technique", "the take-off" and "parachuting into water", were shown.

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Home Nursing Work Stressed

The new "six-lesson course in care of the sick," sponsored by the Red Cross and now being taught in Deschutes county by Mrs. Rachel St. Pierre Sawyer, registered nurse from the San Francisco Red Cross office, was developed in order to shorten the standard home nursing course, Mrs. Sawyer stated today.

It was necessary to shorten the standard course for two reasons: First was the lack of teachers. Two teachers, including Mrs. Sawyer, are working out of the San Francisco area office today where as there were nine teachers a year ago. The same situation has developed throughout the nation. In the second place, many women are now too busy to take the full course.

As hospitals are over-crowded and under-staffed and there is an increasing shortage of medical and nursing personnel, the Red Cross decided that an intensive, short course would assist women in caring for ill members of their families at home. The new "six-lesson" course is planned to teach women to do just that.

"The course," Mrs. Sawyer said today, "stresses the nursing procedure that are most frequently used in the home. It teaches women to meet the needs of their own families for nursing care, insofar as possible."

A new series of "six-lesson" classes starts in the Red Cross offices in the Bank of Bend building on Thursday. There will be a class at 1:30 in the afternoon and another one at 7 p. m. Mrs. Sawyer will teach both classes. The course is free.
