Home Nursing Work Stressed

race of the sick, sponsored by the Red Cross and now being taught in Deschutes county by Mrs. Rachael St. Pierre Sawyer, registered nurse from the San Francisco Red Cross office, was developed in order to shorten the standard home nursing course, Mrs. Sawyer stated today.

It was necessary to shorten the standard course for two reasons: First was the lack of teachers. Two teachers, including Mrs. Sawyer, are working out of the San Francisco area office today where as there were nine teachers a year ago. The same situation has developed throughout the nation. In the second place, many women are now too busy to take

the full course.
As hospitals are over-crowded and under-staffed and there is an increasing shortage of medical and nursing personnel, the Red Cross decided that an intensive, short course would assist women in caring for ill members of their

in caring for ill members of their families at home. The new "six-lesson" course is planned to teach women to do just that.
