

Bears Again Win, Head for Burns; Score Is 49 to 29

Out Our Way



Lakeview, Jan. 19 (Special)—Searching for new worlds to conquer, Bend's high-geared, sharp-shooting Lava Bears today headed for Harney county and Burns, after defeating the Lakeview Honkers 49 to 29 here last night. On Wednesday night, the Bears, coached by Claude Cook, defeated Lakeview 47 to 21.

Paced by tall Doug Wirtz, who rolled up 12 points in the period, the Bears ran wild on the Lakeview court in the opening quarter and at half time the Deschutes boys were out ahead 20 to 3. Apparently determined to keep some of Wirtz' energy on tap for the Burns games tonight and tomorrow night, Coach Cook benched the sharpshooter at the end of the first quarter and the Bear got back in the lineup later in the game only long enough to score a basket. That gave Wirtz the high point honors, 14, for the evening, but his fellow guard, Harold Smith, was close behind with 12 points.

Bears Get Tired

George Murphy, who emerged in the high point role in the Wednesday night game, was held to a basket last night. In the first half, the Bears looked like tournament talent, but appeared to tire badly in the last half. Coach Cook tried out various combinations, obviously looking toward hard games in coming weeks.

The Honkers, who play northern California and south-central Oregon teams, were badly outclassed by the tall Bears, but, nevertheless, outscored the Deschutes team in the second and fourth quarters, as O'Leary, Downs, Barry and Singleton connected for baskets and free throws.

The Bears left early today for Burns and will battle the Bulldogs tonight and Saturday night. Last night's lineup:

Oregon Quintet To Play Huskies

Eugene, Ore., Jan. 19 (UP)—The University of Oregon basketball squad—which is liberally sprinkled with freshman players—will meet a veteran Washington State quintet in a two-game series beginning here tonight.

The Webfeet will be rested after their arduous pre-season tour of non-conference games and a four-game invasion of Idaho and Washington State on their home courts.

Oregon has been getting in plenty of extra preparation for the crucial Cougar series and Coach John Warren expects that his team will have to click extraordinarily well if WSC's high-scoring Vince Hansen and Bobby Rennie are to be stopped.

Hansen, who is 6 feet 8 1/2 inches tall, showed an exceptional basketball-getting talent under the backboard in the Oregon State game.

Warren expects to start Dick Wilkins and Del Smith at forwards; Ken Hays at center; and Bob Hamilton and Jim Bartelt at guards. Washington State's lineup will probably include: Jorison and Gregg, forwards; Hansen, center; and Renick and Hamilton, guards.

The Webfeet will have to win both games if they are to remain in the race as contenders with the University of Washington Huskies, who are still undefeated, while Oregon has lost one game.

(United Press Staff Correspondent) Los Angeles, Jan. 19 (UP)—The University of California at Los Angeles football coach hand-picked a climax today with just about the finest grid mentor in the land either having thrown his hat into the jockey's circle or having it thrown in by some enthusiastic admirer.

Bruin Graduate Manager William C. (Bill) Ackerman, who's at the helm of the Bruins, was flooded with so many applications he suddenly decided to cancel his proposed trip east to interview prospects.

With the list he's got, at this stage approximately 50 applications, he'd have enough coaches on hand to guide the Bruins for the next fifty years.

But this time, Bill, at the prodding of insistent alumni, is proceeding cautiously. They don't want a repeat of what happened at Bruinville for the last five years. And many an unhappy alumna insists UCLA's blackout the past few seasons resulted from too hasty hiring of an untried hand.

This group is plumping furiously for a well-known mentor of tried ability to be tapped for the job. Advocates of this school of thought aren't too insistent just who gets the job but are insistent it goes to someone who is known to have the stuff.

On the other hand, another, but less noisy, faction wants a "duration coach" preferably a UCLA graduate, who'll step in in this era of sudden transfers, limited manpower, etc., until a big-time mentor can be obtained at the war's end.

Johnny Revolva Tucson Favorite

Tucson, Ariz., Jan. 19 (UP)—Fresh from a five-under-par 65 in the tuneup, Johnny Revolva, former PGA champion, became one of the leading contenders today as 78 professional and amateur golfers teed off in the opening round of the first annual \$5,000 Tucson open golf tournament at El Rio country club.

But the Evanston, Ill., pro was up against the best of the game with Byron Nelson, holder of the course record of 63, his "gold dust" twin, Harold (Jug) Spaden, and Slammin' Sammy Sneed of White Sulphur Springs, Va., vying for top spots.

Denny Shute, Akron, O., was also considered a hard man to beat in this tournament. Shute closed with a 31 for a 66 in yesterday's tuneup, tying with Sammy Byrd, Detroit, and Claude Harmon, Grosse Pointe, Mich., for runner-up medalist honors.

Chick Rutan of Birmingham, Ala., who grabbed a surprising 66 in Wednesday's play, added a 67 yesterday. In the same spot were Sneed and Gene Kunes, Hollywood, Fla. Nelson skipped from 67 Wednesday to 69 yesterday while McSpaden went up from 66 to a wild 72.

Mildred (Babe) Diddrikson Zaharias came even with men's par of 70. PGA Champion Bob Hamilton took a 70 as 15 of the invading pros cracked par in the tuneup.

Industrial Chiefs Make Sports Plea

Chicago, Jan. 19 (UP)—Industrial leaders in the Chicago area today prepared to ask the government to turn the sports' go-ahead light to a Kelly green shade in the interest of increased war production.

The war plant executives, leaders in the nation's steel and fabricating industries, believe that in sports lies the answer to absenteeism and increased overall output. They have organized to send requests to sports leaders for a helping hand, to send a plea to the government that sports be allowed to proceed "unmolested," and to spread their plans from coast to coast.

Organizer of the group is Howard M. Reinman, general manager of Industrial Metal Fabricators, Inc., operator of four major Chicago war plants. Among the companies represented are Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing, Carnegie-Illinois Steel, Pressed Steel Car, Inland Steel, Pullman-Standard, Midland Steel and Modern Fabricating and Welding.

Swedish Runner Very Impatient

Stockholm, Jan. 19 (UP)—Swedish distance runner Gunder Hagg said today he was "getting good and tired of sitting around" and that he had about given up on plans to participate in the United States indoor track season because of transportation complications.

Hagg said that he still had received no definite word from Dan Ferris, secretary of the amateur athletic union in the United States. Whether plane or boat transportation would be available in time for him to appear in the National amateur athletic union track meet at New York, Feb. 24.

He set this week-end as an "absolute deadline for my departure."
