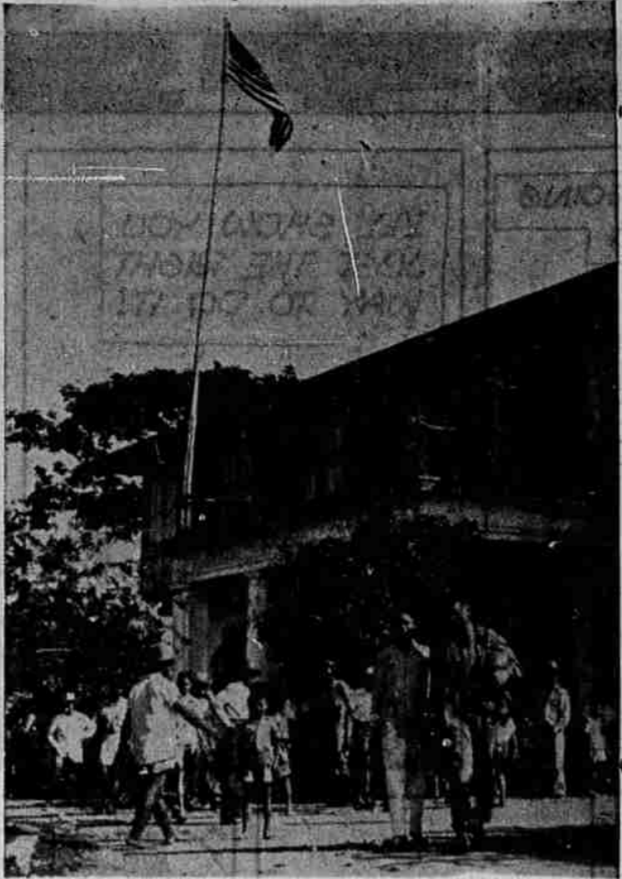

Floyd Fulkerson of Little Rock, Ark., army pilot shot down over Clark field who had been with the guerrillas 20 days; and Lt. (j.g.) Yates Hickey of Seattle, navy pilot shot down over Porac who had been with the guerrillas 36 days.

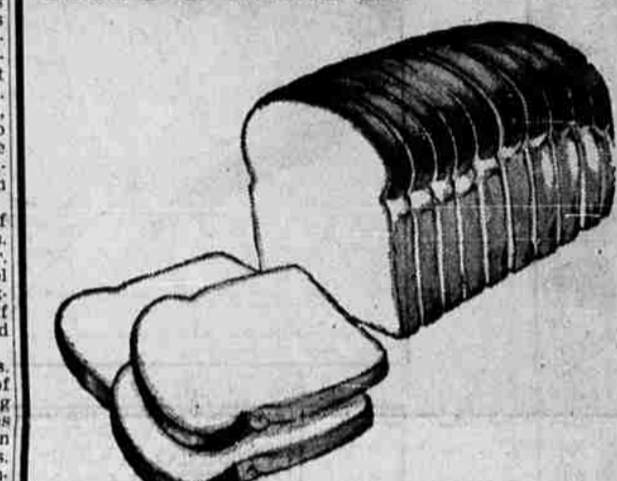
On Dec. 25, Christmas Day, in 1910, Mr. Hale married Lulu Mae Yates at Elmira, Ore. With Mrs. Hale, he came to Bend in November, 1916, and the following July became an employee of Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Company Inc. He was serving as shipping clerk, a position he had held for more than 15 years, at the time of his death.
