Justice Court
Four Sisters youths were arrested Thursday in Sisters by W. F. McGregor, deputy sheriff, and lodged in the Deschutes county jail on vagrancy charges. Appearing before Wilson George, Bend justice of the peace, yesterday they received the following sentences: Jack N. Menear, 17, Sweethome, was placed on probation for one year; James W. Pigott, 17, Sisters, was placed on probation for one year; Charles N. Loyd, 16, Sisters, who assertedly was driving without an operator's license, was fined \$14.50, including costs; Stanley D. Porterfield, 19, Sisters, was fined \$29.50, including costs, and sentenced to three months in the county jail. Porterfield's jail sentence was suspended and he was placed on parole to the justice court. Three Arraigned

Historic Saddle To Be Displayed
Persons visiting the Rim Rock Riders' first annual saddle show tomorrow in the cavalry barn, will have an opportunity of viewing a saddle with a stirring, wild west history. It is the one which was owned by the late Frank Bogue of Lapine, and is between 50 and 55 years of age, according to relatives. The saddle was bought by Bogue in Prineville from a saddler by the name of Boone, who made it. It was first used when Bogue worked for a Bill Brown running wild horses on the desert east of Bend, and when he worked for the Sismore ranch herding cattle. Later Bogue used the saddle in his eight-horse freight team hauling freight from Shaniko for his father's store in Rosland, a mile and a quarter north of Lapine on Little river. The team was driven by a jerk line as Bogue sat in the old saddle. Bogue's father, J. S. Bogue came to Bend in 1855 from Dallas, Ore., and spent two winters here before homesteading near Lapine. In 1900 he built the first general merchandise store at Rosland. Bought Ranch
Later, Frank Bogue, the saddle owner, took a homestead on the Little river and started a herd of cattle of his own. He later bought the Paulina Creek ranch and continued in the cattle business, still using the saddle until his death in January, 1942. Also on display will be a bride

Wiest Services Set for Tuesday

Services for Mrs. L. D. Wiest, Bend pioneer who died Thursday night in Redmond, will be held Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. from the Niswonger & Winslow chapel, with Rev. R. E. Nicholas of the Westminster Presbyterian church, Bend, and Rev. Karl Falkner, of Portland, an early day resident of this city, in charge. It has been requested that there be no flowers. Flora Shunk Wiest was born on March 19, 1860, in York county, Pennsylvania, and her marriage to Levi David Wiest occurred on May 5, 1885, in York, Penn. Two children, Mrs. Montelle G. Coe, Redmond, and Mrs. Herbert Howell, Astoria, survive, as do six grandchildren: Mrs. Arthur Teater, Redmond; Sgt. George David Coe, army air force, Fredericks, Oklahoma; Phyllis Coe, with the Red Cross in England; Dorothy Jean Howell, teacher in the Pacific Grove, Calif., high school; Joan Howell, Oregon State college student, and Janet Howell, Astoria high school student. Start Journey West
It was on Feb. 2, 1886, that Mr. and Mrs. Wiest started a journey west that was eventually to end in Oregon. From Spring Grove, Pa., they moved to Omaha, Neb., and in May, 1889, moved by team to Sheridan, Wyo. In December, 1899, Mr. and Mrs. Wiest continued west, to Portland, and in August, 1900, Mr. Wiest came to the pioneer village of Bend, with Mr. Wiest serving as engineer for the irrigation project being developed by A. M. Drake, founder of Bend. Mr. Wiest homesteaded in the eastern part of the present city of Bend, in the division later platted as Wiestoria, and moved his family here in December, 1901. Mrs. Wiest made her home continuously in Bend from 1901 until 1943. She first made her home with her daughter in Astoria, and for the past six months lived with her Redmond daughter.
