**Processed Foods:** Book 4—Blue stamps X5 through B2 valid through March 31. Blue stamps C2 through G2 valid through April 28. Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2.

**Meat, Butter, Cheese:** Book 4—Red stamps Q5 through S5 valid through March 31. Red stamps T5 through X5 valid through April 28. Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2.

**Sugar:** Book 4—Sugar stamp 34 valid through February 28. Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2.

**Shoes:** Loose Stamps Invalid. Book 3—Airplane stamps 1-23 now valid.

**Gasoline:** Coupons Not Valid Unless Endorsed. "A" coupons, 4 gallons each, valid through March 21.

**Stoves:** Apply local board for oil, gas stove certificates.

**Wood, Coal, Sawdust:** Dealer determines delivery priority from consumer's written statement of annual needs and quantity on hand.

**Fuel Oil:** Period 1, 2, 3 and 4 coupons valid through August 21. Not more than 62 per cent of season's rations should have been used to date in Portland area, 62 per cent in Roseburg area, and 49 per cent in North Head area.
