

Oregon Hoopmen Regain Lead in Basketball Race

Eugene, Feb. 21 (AP)—The University of Oregon basketball team rebounded to a 56-45 victory over the University of Idaho Vandals here last night and by virtue of the triumph regained the top berth in the northern division standings.

The Ducks now lead Oregon State Beavers by a half-game margin and top the Washington State third-place team by a full game. Another victory over the Vandals in a second battle here tonight would hoist the Oregon crew another half-game over their idle rivals.

Last night's battle was a tight affair for exactly eight minutes but after that the Ducks hit their stride and rolled to an easy victory.

Oregon took an opening 7-2 lead but the Vandals came back with three rapid-fire field goals by Tyne, Carbaugh and Overholfer to grab an 8-7 margin.

Oregon Takes Lead

Captain Bob Hamilton of the Ducks then uncorked a long push shot to make it 9-8 for Oregon but Overholfer scored from the gift line a minute later to knot the count at 9-9.

When Hays scored for Oregon to make it 11-9, that was the end of any tightness to the ball game as the Ducks threw their mile-a-minute offense into high gear and rolled up a 34-12 lead with two minutes to go in the first half. Idaho counted seven in those two minutes and the midpoint count was 34-19.

The closest visiting Vandals got in the second half was 50-42 near the end of the game as the Oregon team, using reserves freely held their opponents at safe distance throughout.

The chances for Oregon's Dick Wilkins to crack the northern division scoring record virtually vanished as the rangy Duck forward was held to five points.

Hamilton Big Gun

Captain Bob Hamilton was the big gun in the important Oregon victory with 17 points while Tyne led Idaho with 14.
