Extension Ordered In Coal Wage Pact

Washington, March 31 (IP—The war labor board today ordered an unlimited extension of the soft coal wage contract which expires at midnight with full retroactive pay to the miners for any wage increases finally agreed upon.

The board specified that "the parties shall continue the uninterrupted production of coal." The contract extension, the order said.
