The other would permit resumption of enlistments in the
regular United States army insumption of enlistments in the regular United States army instead of the wartime army of the United States. It is designed to build up a regular army force that will continue in service through the period of post-war demobilization of draftees.

eral demobilization plans, have given congressional leaders the impression that the army wants only 18-year-olds after Germany is defeated. Approximately 100, 000 boys turn 18 each month, of whom about 70 per cent are ac-ceptable under present draft reg-

"They should be enough for the replacement problem confronting us in the war against Japan," commented one member of the senate military affairs committee. "The real job will be one of demobilization of the men already in service rather than drafting. in service rather than drafting anything more than replace-ments."

It was pointed out that the army already has nearly 8,000,000 men in uniform.

"That's more than we can use in the Pacific war," It was said.

It is contemplated that not more than 1,000,000 men will be left in Europe as an army of oc-




