An old whisky bottle contains the bedbugs—a leftover from a case in Portland where one discourt has man near a railroad track in Central Oregon. It is still here as one one ever claimed it.

Many of the exhibits have been claimed by the original owners, while some have been requested by the lawyers who plead the cases. Police departments often like to keep as souvenirs the exhibits in cases in which they have figured.

But many stay in the supreme court basement—and there they will remain, catching more dust.




