

Big Three Delegates, on Eve Of Conference, Fail to Iron Out Difficulties Over Poland

San Francisco, April 24 (UP)—The United Nations conference on international organization was jeopardized today before it began as the American British-Russian dispute over Polish participation was transferred here for adjustment.

The first plenary conference session is scheduled for 4:30 p. m., PWT tomorrow. With scarcely more than 24 hours to go, the "Big Three" found themselves in the embarrassing position of being unable to settle a misunderstanding which they thought they had cleared up last winter in the Crimea.

Efforts to adjust the dispute in preliminary Washington discussions have failed. Some here counted that failure as ominous prelude to the great international effort to guarantee future peace.

Delegates of other nations anxiously awaited the arrival of the top diplomats of the big powers. It generally was conceded that the United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union must adjust this dispute among themselves if the United Nations conference is to have the hoped-for opportunity to write a post-war security charter.

Invitation Asked
The Russians demand an invitation to this conference for the Polish government established in Lublin under soviet auspices. The United States and Great Britain have rejected that demand. Washington and London do not regard the present Lublin government to be truly representative of all democratic Polish elements.

Britain's Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and U. S. Secretary of State Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., have been insisting that the Soviet Union live up to the Crimea agreement that the Lublin government "be reorganized on a broader democratic basis with the inclusion of democratic leaders from Poland itself and from Poles abroad."

That was the sense of the Crimea report on Poland and it was signed by the late President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Marshal Josef V. Stalin.

Arrive By Air
Stettinius, Eden, Foreign Commissar V. M. Molotov, of the Soviet Union, and Foreign Minister T. V. Soong, of China, are coming here separately by air. Soong joined the Washington conference of foreign ministers yesterday after the other three had tabled the deadlocked Polish question.

Odd Fellows Plan For Convention

The Central Oregon convention of the I. O. O. F. lodge will be held on Saturday, April 28, in Redmond, with the Redmond lodge as host. It was announced by Bend Odd Fellows today as final plans for the convention were outlined.

R. H. Anderson, patron patriarch of the grand encampment, is also expected, from Klamath Falls.

To Present Cup
LeRoy Aeschleman, special district deputy grand master of district No. 13, will present the Merchant cup to the lodge making the largest gain in membership this past year. Memorial services will be held for Odd Fellows killed in action.

The convention business session Saturday will start at 2:30 p. m. The convention banquet will be served in the I. O. O. F. hall by the Redmond Rebekahs, at 6:30 p. m. A short closed meeting in the evening will be followed by an open meeting, with a program and dance. Delegates from all central Oregon lodges are expected.

Shuler at Truck Wheel in Italy

With the Fifth Army Italy—Corporal Albert L. Kerwin of Fall City, Wash., and Pfc. Leslie L. Shuler of Bend, drivers for the 316th Combat Engineer battalion, have wheeled six-ton trucks from Anzio to the last peaks before Bologna, Italy.

They heard the first sniper's bullet sing at Velletri where the 316th's Company A received its baptism of fire.

The drivers, who are members of the 91st "Powder River" division, have often found themselves moving over small roads and trails built only for fighter vehicles.
