

## Mindoro, Close to Manila, One of Wildest of Philippines

Washington, D. C. April 24—Mindoro has remained one of the least developed of the larger islands of the Philippines throughout Uncle Sam's 44-year stewardship of the group, says the National Geographic Society.

Ranking seventh in size among the 7,000 islands, Mindoro is half as large as New Jersey. From Mount Calavite, rising 5,000 feet on the peninsula at the island's northwestern tip, a heavy wooded ridge runs east to majestic Mount Halcon, 8,488 feet, at the center of Mindoro's northern coast. From this crown, ranges run toward the island coasts in all directions. Forests reach to the shore of the island at most points. Only along part of the east and in the southwest portion are there grassy, coastal plains where cultivation of sugar cane, manila hemp (abaca) and sisal fiber, tobacco, rice and other crops has been undertaken. Part of the eastern lowlands are swampy, hot and unhealthy. The Yank landings along the southwestern shore are on the sugar-cane plains where the climate is healthful and temperatures are moderate.

Center of this southwest plain is San Jose town, six miles inland. It is 150 air miles almost due south of Manila. Escarceo Point on Mindoro's northern coast is only 75 miles south of Manila and virtually within eyeshot of railroad and highway at Batangas on Luzon, leading directly north to Manila. ## U. S. Troops Hear Russians' Voices

With U. S. Ninth Army, Germany, April 24 (AP)—Troops of the 83rd division, seeking to arrange a meeting with the Russians, established radio liaison with Soviet tanks today, but by late afternoon no contact with the red army had been made on the Ninth army front.

Women's voices could be distinguished clearly in Russian conversations on the tactical radio this afternoon, indicating that higher echelons rather than mere spearheads were within range of the Ninth army's radios.

United Press Correspondent Robert Vermillion, who was with the 83rd's forward elements seeking to contact the Russians, said that by late afternoon they had been neither sighted nor their location pinpointed.
