Beginners' Day Programs Ready

All public elementary schools of Bend will hold their annual Beginners' day program on Friday afternoon, May 11, according to Howard W. George, city school superintendent.

Parents with youngsters who will be in the first grade next fall are being urged to attend and bring their children. Only those children who will be six years of age on or before November 15 are eligible to enter school next September.

At the Reid school, the afternoons' activities are scheduled to begin at 1 p.m., and at the Allen and Kenwood schools the programs start at 1:30 p.m. The primary teachers at each building will be in charge. A special film provided by the Deschutes county health department will be shown. Teachers will discuss the more important problems in connection with preparing the children for school, and refreshments will be served.

In past years, Beginners' day has proven to be a popular program with parents, teachers, and children. George reports. Last year approximately 150 mothers attended the programs in the various buildings.

Farm Labor Office Functions in Bend
As a service to both farm owners and farm laborers, the farm labor office, room 210 in the county courthouse, is equipped to file requests and offer information, and farm labor assistant E. H. Young will be on hand afternoons to answer inquiries, it has been announced.

The objective of the office is to aid in stabilizing farm labor, by encouraging farm helpers to adjust themselves to the requirements of employers, and by placing workmen in jobs that will be agreeable to them, it is explained.

Farmers are asked to cooperate by immediately reporting changes

in their employment status, so that the office can readily make replacements. As applicants are inclined to move from one job to another without notice, they are urged to register with the office and notify the officer when changes must be made.
