The new regulations make the childless widow whose income is less than \$1,000 and the widow The new regulations make the childless widow whose income is less than \$1,000 and the widow with children whose income is less than \$2,500 eligible for benefits simply if her dead husband served at least 90 days in the last war and was honorably discharged.
