Russians Propose More Veto Rights

san Francisco, June 2 (19-New uncertainty and potential controversy was injected into the United Nations conference today by a Russian proposal that the "Big Five's" veto power in the world security council cover a broader range of matters than heretofore contemplated. ontemplated.

Some delegates frankly expressed apprenhension that the Russian plan might throw a new and serious snag into the already delayed progress of the conference. The plan was outlined in the Soviet Union's long awaited interpretation of the Yalta voting formula, presented to the conference's "Big Five" meeting late last night.

The American delegation, meeting this morning, spent 10 minutes discussing routine conference matters. Then it adjourned to the

matters. Then it adjourned to the penthouse apartment of Secretary of State Edward R. Stettinius, Jr., atop the Fairmont hotel to discuss with him the Russian interpretation prior to a session of the "Big Five." That group decided last night to meet daily until the conference's log jam of undecided issues has been broken. Advisers to the "Big Five." had spent most of the night studying the Russian interpretation, of which only a few copies were available. They serutinized it into the small hours of the morning, then rose again after only a few hours sleep to resume their studies.
