## French Cabinet Takes Shape As DeGaulle Stays

Paris, Nov. 21 (UP)—Gen. Charles de Gaulle succeeded today in forming a compromise cabinet, including communist ministers, with himself as chief of government, chief of armies, and director of national defense.

## Transit Lines Seizure Asked By President

Washington, Nov. 21 (UP)—President Truman today ordered immediate seizure of the transportation facilities of the Capital Transit Co. here after street car and bus operators voted overwhelmingly not to end their second walkout in two weeks.

## Thanksgiving Holiday Plans Are Revealed

Residents of Bend and Central Oregon tomorrow will join in their first peacetime Thanksgiving in four years, and present at the tables, abundantly supplied with turkey this season, will be some 700 service men and women who this time last year were in uniform.

## Pearl Harbor Studies Reveal Admiral Richardson Relieved From Duty After Argument

Ex-Commander in Pacific Asserts He Had Objected to President's Order to Base U. S. Fleet at Hawaii; Jap Blockade Considered

Washington, Nov. 21 (UP)—Admiral J. O. Richardson said today that the only explanation he ever got for being removed as commander of the U.S. fleet in 1941 was that he had "hurt the president's feelings."

## Ready for War

Richardson also told the committee that the navy drafted fleet dispersal plans at the administration's request, based on the assumption that the United States was "prepared to accept war" if Japan took aggressive action following British reopening of the Burma supply road to China in 1940.

## Legion Criticizes U. S. Diplomacy

## Better Training Asked

The legion urged President Truman and congress to work for the immediate establishment of a "more thorough and complete system of training and supervision to qualify our diplomatic and consular representatives and their staffs for the efficient and intelligent discharge of their duties."
