## Godoy Is Victor In Haynes Fight

Los Angeles, Nov. 21 (UP)—Arturo Godoy, former South American heavyweight champion from Chile, was one step farther along the comeback trail today with a decision over "knock-down" Johnny Haynes in the Olympic auditorium.

Manager Al Weill said he was taking Godoy to New York immediately to "force the issue" for a fight against Joe Louis, with whom Godoy has already stayed 23-rounds in two title matches.

Haynes, a green 22-year-old fighter imported from Texas, could not stand up last night to the Chilean's close-in fighting and skilled body jabs.

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## Hal Newhouser Award Winner

New York, Nov. 21 (UP)—Hal Newhouser, whose left-handed pitching magic produced 54 Detroit victories in two seasons, became the American league's most valuable player today, the first man to win the award two years consecutively since Jimmy Foxx turned the trick with Philadelphia in 1933-34.

Newhouser, winning by a comfortable margin over his teammate, second baseman Eddie Mayo, and Foxx are the only players ever to be named consecutively in either major league.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 21 (UP)—The Vancouver Canucks took a firmer hold on first place in northern division Pacific coast hockey league standings today after defeating Portland Eagles 8-5 here last night in one of the fastest high-scoring contests of the season.

Approximately 4,000 spectators saw the Canucks go into the lead early in the first period with fast, hard-checking hockey. The Canadians were never headed throughout the contest.

Goalie Fodey of Portland kept the score down with numerous saves as the Canucks were continually at the Portland end of the ice.

Clovechuk, Vancouver wingman, was high-scorer with three goals—all in the first period.

San Francisco will play Vancouver Friday night and then will journey to New Westminster for a game with the Royals on Saturday. It will be the first appearance of California team on northern ice.
