

Unionists Oppose War On Islanders

Portland, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP) — Columbia river district longshoremen today announced they will refuse to load ships carrying troops or war material to Indonesia destined for use against the people there.

At the same time, these CIO union men joined other west coast affiliates in demanding the government speed up return of veterans.

The 2500 members of the district council of the International Longshoremen & Warehousemen's union will not load ships other than troop carriers "unless the government guarantees that all available ship space is being used to bring American servicemen home quickly," said Jeff Davis, president.

Bend Boy Who Died In Europe Honored By Silver Star Medal

Camp Adair, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP) — Camp Adair officers today announced that Chris D. DeLaney, Bend, Ore., had been presented the silver star decoration which

was awarded posthumously to his son, T/Sgt. Emmett C. DeLaney.

The presentation was Sunday, with only relatives and friends of the family attending the private ceremony at Camp Adair. First Lt. Joseph J. Kingsbury, an officer on the staff of Col. Lewis S. Norman, commanding officer, presided.

The father previously received the bronze star decoration awarded his son.

The citation for the silver star award read:

"For gallantry in action on 14 April 1945, in Germany. Sergeant DeLaney was leading a supply train through rear areas toward the front lines when his train was ambushed by enemy soldiers who were using bazooka and small arms fire. Although mortally wounded, he dismounted and ordered his men to take cover while he searched for a man that was missing, but his wounds were so serious that he was unable to continue the search. During a lull in the firing, he ordered his men to run to the last vehicle and get it started and told them that he would then join them. It was not until after he had directed their escape that the men knew he was mortally wounded. By his gallantry and courageous action the lives of three of his men were saved. Sergeant DeLaney's concern for the welfare of his men and gallantry reflect the highest credit upon himself and exemplify the finest traditions of the armed forces of the United States."

Sgt. Emmett DeLaney, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chris DeLaney, 1015 Hartford avenue, Bend, died on April 19, 1945, of wounds received in action in Germany. He had been overseas one year. Emmett came to Bend in April, 1942, and was employed in the Shevlin-Hixon Company box factory. He trained at Rudkur, Ala., and at Fort Knox, Ky., and took part in the 1943 maneuver on the Arizona desert.

Sgt. Calvin Boyd Wins Discharge

Sgt. Calvin Boyd son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Boyd of Bend, was a member of a party of American soldiers who disarmed 2,000 Germans on a large airfield near Bremen after the surrender. It was disclosed here today. Sgt. Boyd was discharged last week at the Ft. Lewis separation center, following 34 months in the European theater with the Ninth engineer command. He arrived at the Washington post Nov. 12, by troop train from the east coast.
