

Lost Girl Case Break Reported; Officers Silent

San Francisco, Dec. 13 (AP)—District attorney Leonard R. Avilla of Santa Clara county said today that a suspect was being held in connection with the mysterious disappearance Nov. 2 of 15-year-old Thora Chamberlain.

Avilla declined to give the name of the suspect as to where he was being held. He said only that "the FBI is handling the case now."

The San Francisco office of the FBI had "no comment."

"We have nothing whatever to say about the case," an FBI spokesman said.

School friends of the girl last saw her driving away from the Campbell high school in San Jose, 50 miles south of here, with a man who asked her if she wanted to make some money by caring for his "sick children."

school. One girl said the man looked "like a truck driver or delivery man, about 32 years of age, with a prominent nose."

Santa Clara county sheriff William J. Emig said at the time he believed the disappearance was a "sex case of some kind."

Thora's mother, Mrs. Frank Chamberlain, told Emig that Thora never had run away from home and was "a good girl, not interested in boys."

The girl's friends described her as mature for her age. A brunette, she was wearing red and white bobby socks, a red skirt, white blouse and blue sweater and was carrying a gabardine shower coat when she last was seen. She was five feet, three inches tall and weighed 120 pounds.

Avilla declined to confirm a report that the "kidnap" car had been located.

Emig yesterday denied published reports that a "man from Ohio" was being held in connection with the possible kidnapping. He said, however, that several persons had been questioned in connection with the disappearance.

The FBI offices in Cleveland said no arrests in connection with the case had been made in the Ohio area.

As fears mounted that the girl might be dead, FBI agents and sheriffs' deputies were reported to be searching the hills around the San Jose for her body.

Lt. Ernest Zeek Gets Purple Heart

Eighth Army Headquarters, Yokohama, Japan, Dec. 13 — Lt. Ernest Zeek, whose wife, Mrs. Enid S. Zeek, lives at 222 Georgia avenue, Bend, has been awarded the purple heart. It was announced by Maj. Gen. H. F. Kramer's 97th Infantry division.

The award was for wounds received in action at Neubodenburg, Germany, on April 16, 1945.

The 97th division saw action in the Battle of the Ruhr and in the Czechoslovakian campaign. It is credited with the capture of the industrial stronghold of Dusseldorf.

At present, the 97th is occupying over 20,000 square miles of territory northwest of Tokyo, the largest division occupation zone on the island of Honshu.

IWA Is Granted Increase In Pay

Portland, Ore., Dec. 13 (AP)—A 2 1/2 cent an hour wage increase was granted International Woodworkers of America, CIO, lumbermen today at the conclusion of a two-day conference with lumber operators.

The settlement for the 2 1/2 cents an hour raise will be effective as of Nov. 1 when an earlier 12 1/2 cent rise was won by the IWA. The boost puts the CIO on a parity with the AFL.

IWA workers will receive also a five-day week with certain exceptions, two weeks vacation with pay and voluntary check-off of dues and assessments.

1944 Case Closed

James E. Fadling, president of the IWA, said the settlement closes the 1944 case, which the workers presented to the national labor board and which recently was referred back by the board for negotiation.

Fadling said the new provisions, if approved by the principals on both sides, will be written into the present contract between the workers and the employers.

At Bend headquarters of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) it was stated today that officials here had not been advised of the wage increase reached in Portland, and therefore they were not in a position to state whether the agreement would be effective in this area.

Unemployment Gains in State

Salem, Ore., Dec. 13 (AP)—Unemployment in Oregon next year is expected to break all records in the eight-year history of the state unemployment compensation commission, Administrator Silas Gaiser said today.

Since the end of the war, unemployment claims in the state have doubled nearly every month, and indications are that monthly claims will be in excess of 150,000 until late spring of 1946.

The commission has hired 200 new employees since the war ended and a branch office has been opened in Portland armory to handle continued claims in that area, now approaching 20,000 weekly.

Station Operator Loses \$2400 Cash

Portland, Ore., Dec. 13 (AP)—Leaving his post for a few minutes Wednesday cost Frank H. Stilson, proprietor of a service station, \$2400.

Stilson told police that some person apparently familiar with the layout walked in and removed that amount of money from his cash box.
