USES Job Drive Response Is Good

J. C. Branaman, manager of the United States Employment service here reported today that excellent co-operation is being received from local civic groups and employers in connection with the drive now being conducted by the Bend office to obtain a greater variety of job orders for veterans.

He said that since the release of publicity last week regarding the fact that job placement of the large number of veterans now registered for work in the Bend office was being handicapped by a lack of variety of orders, considerable employer interest has been shown.

Chase St. Clair, and William Byers of the veterans division now in the process of contacting local employers, have already been able to bring in several new orders. A number of other orders, which have resulted in veterans placement, have also been telephoned into the local office by employers.

To Interview Employers Both St. Clair and Byers will continue to interview employers in the area served by the Bend USES, so that an increasing number of orders will be on hand for available veterans; and according to Branaman, will neglect no possible source of employment for these men.

Jap Starvation Danger Denied

Tokyo, Dec. 21 (AP)—Col. Crawford F. Sams, chief of the public health and welfare section of allied supreme headquarters today accused the Japanese government of falsely representing the country's food situation in an attempt to get the United States to furnish food.

He asserted that the Japanese are in no danger of starvation this winter.

"The Japanese will have relatively more food this winter than the peoples of defeated European nations," Sams said.

He pointed out that Japanese sources estimated their own food production will furnish 1,375 calories and 41 grams of proteins daily for each person in Japan for the next calendar year.

Food on Hand He said allied figures indicated that enough food is on hand to furnish "well over" 1,500 daily calories until April or May.

"Even in 1942, with Japan importing foods from her stolen empire, the per capita food allowance was only 1,872 calories, 49 grams of protein. The German population will have to get along this winter on a per capita allowance of 1,550 calories," he said.

He added that the food requirements of orientals is at least 20 per cent less than that for occidentals.

"The main problem in Japan is poor distribution," Sams added. "We propose to see that the Japanese correct this to assure the 'little man' he gets his fair share of available food. Otherwise, people with money will get it all."

Single Men Lead In State Census

Portland, Ore., Dec. 21 (AP)—Oregon has 117 single men to every single woman, according to an article by Dr. Clifford R. Adams in this month's Woman's Home Companion.

Dr. Adams says Oregon ranks eighth among the states in the number of single men in proportion to single women.

States outranking Oregon are Nevada, with 177 men to each woman. Wyoming 165, Idaho 131, California 128, Arizona 127, Montana 125 and Washington 122.
