Stocks Continue Decline 3rd Day

New York, Dec. 21 (AP)—Stocks continued their decline today for the third successive session as trading held at the slow pace of the last two days.

Pre-holiday considerations, coupled with the absence from Wall street of large numbers of brokers who began their Christmas holiday early, resulted in the small volume.

Losses throughout the list ranged around a point, although there were a few firms including Checker Cab, up to a new 1945 high at 96, Central Pacific, up 2 1/2 to a new top at 47, and Childs Co. up more than a point to a new peak at 40.

Losses of a point or more were noted for such leaders as American Telephone, Eastman Kodak, Goodyear, Youngstown Sheet & Tube, Santa Fe and U. S. Gypsum. There also were losses of 1 to 2 points in Johnson and Johnson, Ex-Cell-O Corp., Libby-Owens-Ford, Deere & Co., and Central Vieta sugar.

The wind was reported on the Washington side around Cape Horn.

Support For Egg Prices Probable

Washington, Dec. 21 (AP)—The agriculture department soon will announce a 1946 egg price support program which may cost the government \$200,000,000, it was learned today.

Even though eggs are scarce at the moment, the department fears production next year may be 600,000,000 more dozens than consumers will be willing to buy. The worst market glut is anticipated between early March and June.

If this large surplus materialized it could bring a price collapse worse than two years ago when eggs sold for as little as 15 cents a dozen.

The government will seek to prevent that. It is committed by law to support prices at the farm level at 90 per cent of parity, or about 29 cents, according to the department's latest estimate.

Program Outlined

The price support program will be designed to give farmers this return of 29 cents a dozen—but as a national average, not individually. For instance, farmers in the midwest will be guaranteed only an average of 27 cents a dozen, and then only if the eggs they offered meet department standards.

Eggs in the big city markets on the east and west coasts are expected to bring higher prices to pull the national average up to support levels. The central states, "the egg basket of the United States," produce 60 per cent of the nation's supply and their prices historically lag about two cents behind coastal areas.
