

Corvallis Quintet Beats Bend Bears On Spartan Floor

Victors over Albany 42 to 38 in a hard struggle Friday night, Bend's Lava Bears, playing four contests in one week, dropped a No-Name basketball league game to the tall Spartans on the Corvallis floor Saturday night, 63 to 43. Bend's defeat appeared largely due to the inability of the fatigued Bears to hit the basket, and they missed plenty of easy ones that would have changed the game into a great fourth-quarter battle.

The Spartans, paced by two eagle-eyed guards, Stevens and Osborne, took a 14 to 5 lead over the Bears in the first quarter and were never headed. At halftime, the Corvallis team was out ahead 33 to 13, and at the end of the third quarter the Spartans were still going strong, holding a 51 to 27 lead. The Bears started moving in the final period, but time was just too short to pare down the lead to any great extent.

Use Zone Defense
The Bears used a zone defense against the Spartans, but were unable to stop Osborne and Stevens, who lobbed in shot after shot, in howitzer fashion, over the defenders' heads. Osborne was high point man for the evening, with a total of 19 points to his credit. Sheffield was high for Bend with ten points, despite considerable difficulty in the first half in connecting with the basket. He made practically all his points in the second half.

The trans-mountain trip was a hard one on the Bears, largely due to travel difficulties. They were hours late in reaching Albany for their first contest, arriving in time to gulp a hurried meal before going on the floor. On their return trip, they did not get into Bend until 4 a.m. Sunday morning although they started home shortly after the game was over.

Tonight, the Bears are to get a much needed rest, then on Tuesday night will swing back into practice for two home games here Friday and Saturday nights against No-Name league teams, Salem will be here Friday night, and Albany will provide the opposition Saturday night.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 21 (UP)—Oregon State college today was hanging onto its slim lead in the northern division of Pacific coast conference basketball by virtue of a split series over the week end with University of Oregon.

Oregon State lost Friday night to Oregon 53 to 48, but coach Slat's Gill's Beaver quintet surged back Saturday night before a near capacity house at Eugene's MacArthur court and slapped the webfoots 59 to 45. Sparking the Orange attack was Ephraim (Red) Racha, 6 foot 8 inch center, who sunk seven baskets and seven free throws for a total of 21 points.

The win kept the Orangemen on top of the heap with four wins against one defeat while Washington has four wins against two losses.

Toronto Icemen Defeat Redwings

 The Toronto Maple Leafs, striking belatedly for a spot in the National league's Stanley cup hockey playoffs, picked up four precious points in weekend victories and today stood only six points behind the Detroit Redwings.

Of major importance was Toronto's 3 to 1 victory over the fourth place Redwings at Detroit last night.

The Rangers, who had visions of a playoff berth only a week ago, dropped their fourth straight game last night, 9 to 1, to the Blackhawks at Chicago before 19,749 fans, largest crowd ever to witness a National league game.

Chicago regained a first place tie by winning, since Montreal dropped a 2 to 0 decision to the Bruins at Boston.

Colored Wizards Suffer Defeat

Portland, Ore., Jan. 21 (UP)—The famous Harlem Globetrotters, colored wizards of the court, suffered one of their few defeats here Sunday at the hands of Fee's roller-drome, Portland's top independent amateur team, 39 to 30, before a capacity crowd.

The colored Aces were leading 21 to 19 at the half but the roller-drome five poured in five consecutive baskets right after opening of the second period. The trotters tied the score at end of third quarter but the locals immediately forged ahead again and were never topped.

3 Ex-Champions Billed For Action

New York, Jan. 21 (UP)—Former champions Lew Jenkins, Chalky Wright and Phil Terranova will see action on this week's national boxing schedule.

Jenkins, ex-lightweight boss, meets Charlie Jeffries at Danbury, Conn., Friday night in the opening show staged by promoter Pete Montesi, a war hero who lost an arm and a leg in Germany. Jenkins is donating his services, as are Rocky Graziano and Ruby Goldstein who will act as referees.

The two ex-featherweight champs also fight Friday night. Wright encounters Pedro Firpo at St. Nicholas arena in New York and Terranova engages Steve Curley at New Orleans.

'Tourist' Golfers Head for South

Richmond, Calif., Jan. 21 (UP)—Goldform's winter "tourists" headed toward Phoenix, Arizona, today with a familiar name occupying an unfamiliar spot at the top of the list of shotmakers.

Toney Penna, Dayton, O., captured the \$10,000 Richmond war bond tournament yesterday with a 73 last round to card a 280 total four under par.

Until yesterday, Toney hadn't won a major tournament since 1938 when he was low man in the Kansas City open.

The 39-year-old Italian came up to the 18th and final hole needing a birdie four to win. A par five would have dropped him into a four way tie for the title and necessitated a play-off.
