

Owens' Ball Team Is Crowd Pleaser; Loses In Portland

Portland, Ore., Feb. 13 (UP)—A flashy all-negro basketball team, captained by Jesse Owens, all-time American track great, who lectures and runs between halves, currently is packing high school gymnasiums throughout the country.

Barnstorming across the United States with his Kansas City negro stars, Owens is presenting basketball in highly fast and clever style. To date, with the exception of their first defeat here Sunday, Owens' colored units have won 63 straight victories with scores passing the 100 mark on numerous occasions.

Portland Quint Wins
The only flaw in the unusual winning streak came when Fee's roller-drome, northwest AAU basketball champs, defeated Owens' basketball marvels 60-46 in one of the fastest games in the northwest this season.

But the defeat hasn't dismayed Owens, who says his basketball team is mainly an "ambassador of good will among the races," and not just out for a string of victories.

During intermission of every game, Owens takes over the basketball floor to lecture first on the 220 yard dash and the hurdle—and then juvenile delinquency and the inter-race problem.

His running hasn't yet failed to please. Still showing the agility and grace of the Olympics that carried him in the 30's, Owens demonstrates the breakaway from the starter's gun and the technique of the hurdle.

Makes "Little Talk"
But the main part of the program is his "little talk" to his "younger friends."

When addressing basketball crowds, which are evenly divided among oldsters and youngsters, Owens declares, "all my team and I are here for is to promote interest in basketball, so that the youngsters can find interest in it and thus build healthy bodies while usefully occupying their time away from their studies."

"There's no juvenile delinquency, really," Owens says. "The only thing today, there are more things to do than in grandmother's and grandfather's time."

"We welcome the youngsters to these games, and from them we hope they can learn that all men can participate in sport together and learn that sportsmanship is part of the brotherhood of man."

Louis Training For Conn Battle

Los Angeles, Feb. 13 (UP)—Heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis unlimbered his golf clubs today, intent on getting as much fairway recreation as possible before going into training for his title bout with Billy Conn. Louis said he had a new technique to try out on Conn, and "anyone who says this fight is going to be like the last time we met is wrong."

After a 20-day vacation here, Louis will go to French Lick, Ind., to begin training. Later he will taper off at Pompton Lakes, N. J.

Cougar Quintet Defeats Oregon

Eugene, Ore., Feb. 13 (UP)—Hopes for a northern conference basketball title, "went out the window" today for the University of Oregon after a dormant Washington State quintet arose from a seasonal sleep to defeat the defending champion Webfoots 68 to 61.

The Cougars gained their stride through the exceptional basketball wizardry of Gale Bishop, who scored 32 points. 22 in the first half to come within two-points of tying the conference record held by his teammate Vince Hanson and by Don McMillin of the University of Washington. The record is 34 points.

Washington State held the lead throughout the game except when the score was tied and once midway in the first half when Oregon held a momentary lead. The Cougars ended the half with a 32 to 25 margin.

After the score had been tied at 4, 6, 8, 16, 18 and 19, the Cougars found their stride and were never headed. The two teams resume play tonight.

Coasting Along in the Sport World

Los Angeles, Feb. 13 (UP)—George Pepperdine college, the little school with the big basketball team, hopes to win new athletic laurels in an invasion of the Hawaiian islands for a cage series.

Already in possession of one of the most widespread schedules in the land, the Pepperdines will push their travels another 2,000 miles west with their jaunt to the islands.

So far this season the Pepperdine club has traveled as far east as Indiana, south to New Orleans, all through the huge state of Texas. After completing its regular schedule, the Waves will go to Kansas City, Mo., next month to play in the national interscholastic tourney for small colleges.

Upon returning from there the club will sail for Honolulu about March 25.

In the Hawaiian invasion, the basketballers will play from six to eight games, three against top-flight AAU civilian teams and three against servicemen's fives.

One tilt is to be played on the island of Hawaii, while the others will be in the Honolulu area on the island of Oahu.

The Pepperdine team, which averages in height about 6 feet, 3 inches, is sparked by two all-Americans: Capt. Nick Buzolich, and Bob Clark. Buzolich towers 6 feet, 7½ inches and leads the squad in scoring. The club's record isn't what it should be.
