

Designer Urges Fewer Rooms

Des Moines, Ia. (P)—William W. Wurster, nationally known housing architect, believes that home builders might do well to think about the old log cabin way of life.

At a forum here recently, Wurster said it would be wise to consider whether to have fewer and larger rooms rather than "room after room after room."

Wurster, who is dean of architecture and planning at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, pointed out that the old log cabin provided both outside and inside finish plus insulation, all in one operation. About the only modern substitute, he said, is cement block.

The expert said greater use should be made of individual rooms, and that in many instances rooms could be combined for better living economy and convenience.

Bedrooms, he pointed out, could be used on a round-the-clock basis instead of only eight to 10 hours out of each 24. One suggestion was to use them as private sitting and study rooms during the daytime.

Kitchens could be incorporated into the dining or living room with more convenience and "livability" than the present system of having them separate.

Wurster also advocated house plans that "take in more of the outdoors." A room opening into a garden, or having a large area of glass would serve to make the house look larger, plus allowing increased light and air to get inside.

The expert admitted that house planners must accustom themselves to doing away with "lesser comforts and refinements" if they want to build homes in the \$2,500 to \$5,000 class and have it modern and convenient.

How to Use Meat to Make Breakfasts Hearty

Drop by tablespoonfuls onto greased griddle or frying pan. Bake until bubbles break; turn and bake until golden brown. Wrap each pancake around a well-cooked sausage link. Serve hot with warm syrup. Serves 6.

SAUTEED KIDNEYS—Skin, split in half lengthwise, and remove white tubes and tissues from 6 to 12 veal or lamb kidneys. Wash thoroughly. Cut into thin slices and cover with flour, salt and pepper. Sauté in drippings about 3 minutes or until browned. Add 1 cup hot water and cook about 5 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Serve hot. Serves 6.

HASHED BROWN POTATOES—Melt 3 tablespoons shortening in a heavy frying pan; add 3 cups chopped or finely cut cooked potatoes, heaping them toward the center and away from the edges of the pan; season to taste. Cover with a lid or heavy plate; press down so that cover is right on top of the potatoes. Place a box of salt or rock on top to give pressure. Cook slowly and without turning for 15 to 20 minutes, or until crusty brown. Turn out onto a warm plate. Cut into 4 or 6 pie-shaped wedges to serve.
