

Training Course Date Announced

A training institute for instructors who teach social studies in junior and senior high schools in Deschutes, Crook, Jefferson and Wheeler counties, will be held Feb. 22 and 23 in Redmond. It was announced today by County school superintendent J. Alton Thompson.

The institute is one of 16 similar sessions planned throughout the state and will be conducted by a staff of University of Oregon and Oregon State college faculty members. A highlight of the conference will be an open meeting at 7:30 Friday evening, with all teachers, high school students and the general public invited to attend.

Among subjects which will be discussed at the sessions are the attitude and general procedure of the teacher in handling controversial topics and special training methods which are recommended for students of varying mental ability.

Similar inservice institutes are held each year on different subjects, with the social sciences selected for special consideration at the 1946 meetings.

Dark Star Found In Distant Sky

Pittsburgh (UP)—A "dark star," one of the rarest finds in modern astronomy, has been discovered by Dr. Nicholas E. Wagman, acting director of the Allegheny observatory, University of Pittsburgh.

The new star, discovered accidentally during photographic telescope research, is a "companion" of the brightest star in the constellation Ophiuchus. Dr. Wagman was photographing bright stars through an absorbing glass to establish their relative distances, when he discovered that Alpha Ophiuchi, bright star of the constellation, was moving in an orbit indicating the presence of a "dark" companion star.

Preliminary estimates indicate that the star is one similar to our sun, Dr. Wagman said, but its light is obscured because the bright star of the constellation outshines it 20 times.

"This companion appears to be moving around the bright star at a distance seven times that of the earth from the sun or about 700,000,000 miles," he said. "The circuit is completed in eight and a half years."

According to Dr. Stanton C. Crawford, dean of the college, University of Pittsburgh, and chairman of the observatory committee, the first such discovery was that of the companions of Sirius and Procyon in 1844.

ART POPULARITY GROWS
Chicago (UP)—By way of stressing the increasing popularity of art, Daniel Catton Rich, director of the Art Institute of Chicago, has pointed out that 1,081,208 persons visited the institute last year. That was an increase of 65,000 or approximately 10 per cent.
