Couple Survives Brush With Death

of \$4,000 on hand which might be used in development of the baseball field, and added that a certain sum of insurance money is also due from the O'Donnell field fire.

Possibility that a special election might be held was indicated after the commission received a petition from residents in Virginia park for annexation to the city. Acting City attorney Alva Goodrich said that the petition is to be checked to determine whether it has the required number of signatures necessary to call the election.

Ted S. Holliday spoke in behalf of the annexation, saying that the Virginia park residents favored annexation in order to get city utilities, particularly water. If this is accomplished, he said, he planned immediately to erect eight dwellings. The commission decided that if the district is annexed, water would be served on a meter basis.

The commissioners also voted to make a bid on the sewage disposal plant at Camp Abbot. If acquired, it would be used in connection with the proposed sewer expansion in Bend.
