

## Lava Bears Lose To Rainier Quint In Close Contest

Salem, Ore., March 13 (UP)—The favorite and the underdog both won a round last night in the initial play of the Oregon class "A" high school basketball tournament at Willamette university. Medford's fast breaking Tornadoes overwhelmed Roosevelt high of Portland, 48 to 34, and a lightly touted Rainier quintet knocked over the Bend Bears, 47 to 42.

Thus the southerners and Rainier gain places in the quarter finals and will rest today while Hillsboro meets Eugene, Salem tangles with Marshfield, McMinnville faces Central Catholic of Portland, and Baker mixes with Oregon City in the afternoon sessions.

**Games Billed**  
Tonight Washington of Portland, defending champions, scrap with The Dalles and the Astoria-Lebanon encounter will wind up the session.

It was a team-play victory for Medford last night. The Tornadoes held a slim margin at the half and three-quarter mark, but sparked in the final frame even without the service of Riggs, their star center, who left the game on fouls. Ross was high pointer for the victors while Brouwer and Peterson split the honors for Roosevelt.

Rainier ran into a Lava Bear squad that seemed still in winter hibernation. It was a slow game until the last five minutes of play, when the Central Oregon five showed enough life to whittle down a tie. But Rainier shooting proved the five point margin of victory and sent them into the second round as one of the big unknowns of the tourney.

**Sheffield Is High**  
Bob Ball, Rainier guard, snatched top scoring laurels from teammate Herb Evans, with 15 tallies for the night. Evans grabbing 13 at the other guard spot. Bill Sheffield rimmed the ring for 17 counters for Bend but was unable to find support for his efforts.

## Coasting Along in the Sport World

Puuukoku Ranch, Molokai Island, Hawaii, March 13 (UP)—Did you ever shoot a wild peacock? Or go on a wild goat slaughter or a wild jackass roundup?

This is one of the few places left in the war-scarred world where the birds, the animals and the natives live as they did hundreds of years ago.

This is Paradise Island. The natives call it Molokai, or Leper Island, or "The Rock," or "The Land Where the Hills and the Stars Meet," or Friendly Island.

But it's strictly a sportsman's paradise, no matter what it's called.

The 40,000-acre Puuukoku ranch at the southern tip of the 55-mile long island is covered with a lush undergrowth that gives perfect protection to the wild game.

We hopped on horses the other morning just after breakfast and within two miles of the ranch our party spotted a herd of deer. We were back at home a half hour later with a 200-pound, six-point buck.

There is no open or closed season on any of the game—and the hunting is good the year 'round.

Roosting in the trees near the ranch buildings are dozens of wild peacocks—gorgeous creatures, but with the devil's own cry.

The other day we went fence riding and soon two tiny jackasses (the kind children ride at carnivals) were following us. Up on the plateau, a few miles away, are hundreds of these animals running wild.

They are of no use to the ranch, in fact are more or less pests. But they are such lovable creatures that the ranch hands just ignore them rather than destroy.

Within an hour and a half horseback ride from here are the wild goats—as much of a pest on this land as jackrabbits are in the sage brush on the mainland. Anyone with a desire to hunt them could sit in one spot all day with a 30-30 and bring them down and win the thanks of the natives.

Of the more common game there are pheasants, quail, sage hens, jungle fowl, etc. It's truly a sportsman's paradise where there always is game meat to go along with the seafood caught from the doorstep for every meal.

## New York Yanks Win 4 Contests

St. Petersburg, Fla., March 13 (UP)—The New York Yankees, eight ex-GIs and a converted second baseman, were the winners of the grapefruit circuit today, holding four consecutive victories over supposedly the two best teams in Florida.

The Bombers from the Bronx, after routing the St. Louis Cardinals three games in a row, came back yesterday to blast the world champion Detroit Tigers, 12 to 1, in a "big inning" display reminiscent of the prewar power of the DiMaggio-Gehrig-Dickey "murderers' row."

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## Shift Of Coaches Leaves Vacancies

New York, March 13 (UP)—College coaching ranks underwent a fast turnover today with the hiring of two coaches, the resignation of two others, and the return from service of still another.

The swift overnight shift left Columbia, Princeton and Navy minus head basketball coaches while Pittsburgh gained a football chief and Georgetown university, preparing to return to big-time intercollegiate competition next season, rehired Elmer Ripley, who piloted the Hoyas hoop teams to prewar prominence.

**Fesler Leaves**  
Princeton lost a double-duty man when Wesley Fesler, head basketball and assistant grid coach, signed a three-year contract as head football man at the University of Pittsburgh. He succeeds Clark Shaughnessy, who left under fire, Feb. 4, and returned to Maryland as football chief.

John N. Wilson retired as the Middle's basketball coach, a post he held since 1927. No announcement was made as to his successor or the reason for his resignation.

Columbia lost its head basketball mentor when Paul Mooney resigned to enter private business. Formerly an assistant, Mooney took over the top spot at Columbia in 1934.

## 2 Tennis 'Mites' Meet On Courts

New York, March 13 (UP)—Two of tennis' mightiest mites, Francisco (Pancho) Segura and Frank Guernsey, meet today in the highlight quarter finals match of the national indoor championships at the seventh regiment armory.

Although one of the nation's brightest stars, Elwood Cooke, was eliminated yesterday, these two pint-sized players breezed into the quarter finals without exertion.

Segura, colorful national collegiate champion from Ecuador, ousted J. Gilbert Hall, 6-1, 6-2, while Guernsey, one-time Rice Institute standout and ex-N.C.A.A. title holder, romped through Enrique Buse of Peru, 6-2, 6-2.

Portland, March 13 (UP)—Portland university has climbed back on the gridiron bandwagon by signing for a 1946 football contest with the University of Santa Clara, to be played here October 13.

## Seek Bad Storms For Static Study

Las Vegas, Nev. (UP)—A specially-equipped Flying Fortress was on its way today to make movies of the worst weather it could find in the world over a period of two months.

Staffed by a Transcontinental and Western Air Lines crew, the B-17 will fly over Brazil, Africa, India, China, New Guinea, Japan and Pacific islands, deliberately hunting wild, tropical storms.

Movie cameras installed in the plane will record readings of the instruments to measure electrical properties of these storms and aid in development of new static-elimination devices.

The army will then be able to set up similar artificial static conditions to test the new devices.

Full-time lobstermen on the coast of Maine operate from 100 to 150 traps or pots each, which they visit daily if the weather permits.
