

Korea's Problems Receiving Study

Seoul, Korea, March 21 (AP)—Delegates to the joint United States-Soviet commission have reached agreement on procedural details and delegates expect to work harmoniously in the task of setting up a provisional government for Korea, Maj. Gen. A. V. Arnold, American delegate, said today.

Arnold told a press conference that discussions at the initial meeting yesterday appeared to be on a more friendly basis than at a joint preparatory conference last month that left Russians and Americans split on several questions.

Arnold pointed out that many members of the commission also served at the conference. Delegates were optimistic that they would be able to work well with one another in solving the problem of Korea, he added.

He said the commission would continue to meet until the independence of Korea is established. Trips will be made to Pyongyang, capital of the Soviet-occupied zone, to interview political parties and groups.

Colonel L. H. Hall Heads VA Office

Seattle, March 21 (AP)—A veteran of both world wars has been appointed as manager of the Seattle regional office of the veterans administration effective April 1st, deputy administrator D. M. Shute announced today.

Ex-Colonel Lester H. Hall, a native of the northwest, will replace present manager Orville G. Fairburn because of his long experience in personnel work and familiarity with world war II veterans problems, Shute said.

Hall served as personnel officer at Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., at the engineering replacement center and is a graduate of the command and general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth.

Colonel Hall was stationed at Camp Abbot, as executive officer, and moved to Fort Lewis with the army engineers when the Deschutes camp was deactivated in 1944.

Early-Day Sisters Business Is Sold

Sisters, March 21 (Special)—On March 1 one of the oldest business establishments in Sisters, the Aitken drug store, opened its doors under new management. For 34 years the store was operated by its owners, Mr. and Mrs. George E. Aitken, with Mrs. Aitken carrying on the business after

her husband's death in 1944. The Aitkens were among the pioneer settlers of Sisters, witnessing its growth from a few scattered ranches to the modern, thriving community of today. Twenty years ago their business was almost completely destroyed in the disastrous fire which swept this Santiam-McKenzie town leaving only two buildings undamaged. But in the spirit of the times, the Aitkens rebuilt the store and began anew.

Today the modernized store is being operated by Richard Day, owner of Day's cafe before his

entry into the armed forces. SC2/c Day served in the navy for 20 months aboard a minesweeper stationed at Pearl Harbor. He received his discharge Dec. 7, 1945, and returned to Sisters seeking a new place of business. After conferring with Mrs. Aitken, arrangements were made for the purchase of the drug store.

Mrs. Aitken and her son, Donald, a student at Sisters high school, have purchased a new home and plan to remain in Sisters.

Crash Is Blamed On Broken 'Prop'

Truckee, Calif., March 21 (AP)—A broken propeller blade which set up a vibration that caused the right wing of an army C-47 transport to break off in mid-air apparently was responsible for the violent death of 23 passengers and three crewmen Tuesday near here, army officials disclosed today.

One blade of one of the transport's two three-bladed propellers either split or broke off in flight, Col. Willard said, setting up a tremendous vibration.

The plane's pilot, Capt. Richard K. Young of Stockton, Calif., evidently tried to feather the engine and stop the vibration, Willard said.

He said wreckage of the right engine disclosed that it had been shut off and feathered.

The feathering operation takes approximately eight seconds. During that time, Col. Willard said, the terrific vibration apparently caused the transport's right wing to tear off.

Madras Pioneer Sold to W. H. Hall

Madras, Ore., March 21 (AP)—Sale of the weekly Madras Pioneer, Jefferson county's only newspaper, to W. H. Hall, formerly mechanical superintendent with the Telephone-Register at McMinnville, was announced today by Mrs. May B. Johnson, owner of the paper since 1925.

Before coming to Oregon, Hall published the Buhl, Ida., republican. Later he was associated with two brothers in publishing the Lincoln county Leader at Toledo, Ore. Hall is also a former member of The Bend Bulletin mechanical staff, in Bend.
