

Bend Pole Vaulter Sets New Mark In Triangular Meet

Coach Claude Cook's Lava Bear trackmen invaded Crook county yesterday afternoon to roll up a decisive victory over Prineville and Redmond and set another new mark in the second triangular track meet of the 1946 season. Bend registered 72 points while Redmond and Prineville, almost neck and neck the whole time, ended up with 39½ and 37½ points respectively.

George Rasmussen, who set a new Lava Bear record of 12 ft., 3 in., in the pole vault last Friday at Redmond, went himself one better yesterday to top the state record with a vault of 12 feet, 6 inches. The tall Bend cleared the mark with so little difficulty that fans are of the opinion he would have gone even higher if the bar could have been raised. The 12 foot, 6 inch height was the maximum possible with the supports being used yesterday.

Relay Team Wins

Bend's relay team, a weak point in last week's contest, came home well ahead of yesterday's relay field, while Don McCauley, who set a new Bear record of 140 feet, 2 inches in the discus throw last week, placed first again in both the shot-put and discus events. Rasmussen, triple-threat man, added two more firsts to Bend's total of nine by winning both the high and low hurdles easily. Dick Maudlin of Bend yielded to Rodman of Redmond in the broad jump, and Prineville's Quant tied Hawes of the Bears for first place in the high jump event. Also a repeater from last week was Clark of Bend, who again won the 880 yard run.

At San Francisco, the Seals were trailing 1 to 2 when they combined four hits and a walk to score four runs in the sixth inning and drive bespectacled Jack Salveson from the mound to take over the lead which they never relinquished. Al Lien got credit for the Seal win, his third of the season.

Pullman, Wash., April 13 (UP)—The Washington State college Cougars won two non-conference baseball games from the Whitman college Missionaries on Pullman's Rogers field yesterday. The Cougars won the first game and emerged victorious in the second contest 13 to 2.

Bend Trap Club Plans Big Shoot

Under the sponsorship of the Bend Trap club, a registered shoot that is expected to attract entrants from many parts of Oregon will be held here on May 5. It was announced today by officers of the club as final arrangements were completed. The Bend shoot has been certified by the Pacific International Trapshooting association, of which Charles Dockendorf is secretary, and will be the state's "big shoot" of the May 5th week end.

Three hundred dollars in added prizes are to be offered for the competition that is to include 100 singles, 100 handicap events and 2 pairs of doubles. Scores made will be included in the PITA official records, and PITA rules will govern the competition.

The shoot will be held on the Bend Trap club grounds just south of town, which is a large tract of land. It is hoped that the Oregon scatter-gun marks men. Lunch will be served on the grounds.

This will be Bend's first registered shoot in five years. Shoots were ruled out during the war years as the gunners cooperated in the move to save ammunition for the fighting forces.

Portland squads are expected to be among those entered for the May 5 competition.

Clubmen To See 'Realm of Wild'

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Brenda Hesler's Win Protested By Californians

Seattle, April 13 (UP)—Comely Brenda Hesler, a Hollywood movie aspirant, scored an upset victory over Ann Curtis of San Francisco to win the 100-yard freestyle event in the senior women's national AAU indoor swimming championships here last night.

Miss Hesler dethroned the defending champion with apparent ease, finishing two yards in front to set a new meet record of 1:04 for the distance. She was racing under the colors of Portland's Multnomah club.

Gets Second Spot

Miss Curtis, representing San Francisco's Crystal Plunge, edged out teammate Marilyn "Sugar" Sahner from second place. Joyce McCrae of San Francisco was fourth. Muriel Mellon, unattached entrant from San Diego, Cal., was fifth and Mary Ann Hansen, of Multnomah A.C., sixth.

Zoe Ann Olsen, 15-year-old diving sensation from Oakland, Cal., topped all rivals to retain her crown in the one-meter springboard event with 176.06 points. She represented the Athens athletic club. Second was Leota Schwartz, Los Angeles A.C., who outpointed the Athens club's Gloria Wooden. Fourth place went to Evelyn Moore of the Pasadena A.C.

Miss Merkle Wins

Portland's 19-year-old Nancy Merkle scored an upset in the 300-yard medley individual when she finished ahead of defending champion Clara Lamore, Procter, R. I. Miss Merkle's time for the event was 4:00.1—only one second off the existing American record.

The Oakland Athens club's 200-yard junior national relay squad turned in the best performance in the evening's final event with a time of 2:02.5. Portland's Multnomah club was second, Washington athletic club was third and Victoria, B.C., YWCA finished last.

The end of the first day's competition found the Oakland Athletics club holding a commanding lead in team points in the three-day meet.

Miss Hesler's appearance under the Multnomah club's colors was protested prior to the meet by the southern Pacific and Pacific associations, representing southern and northern California, on grounds her last minute affiliation with the Portland group was a violation of AAU rules. The protest will be referred to the national group for decision after the meet.

San Francisco's star Helen Graham was expected to see action today after being withdrawn from yesterday's events on doctor's orders. San Francisco coach said he expected Miss Graham to aid in smashing the present national indoor women's record in the 400-yard relay.

Twelve national women's amateur athletic union titles are at stake in the meet, which will be concluded tomorrow night.

Boston Olympics Defeat Canucks

Vancouver, B.C., April 13 (UP)—The Boston Olympics sextet defeated the Vancouver Canucks 9 to 6 last night in the first game of a best out of seven series to determine the national amateur hockey championship.

Tenti Lund led the Boston attack with three goals in the hotly played game in which two players, Vancouver's Dick Gray and Boston's Pete Babando, were ejected for fighting.

Andy Clevechuck scored three for the Canucks.

High School Ball Tourney Planned

Portland, Ore., April 13 (UP)—Oregon will have its first annual high school baseball tournament in Portland, May 23 through 25, according to plans announced here today by the Oregon high school activities association.

Eight class "A" and four class "B" teams will compete for state titles in their respective divisions. To determine the division finalists, the state will be divided into four class "A" districts while the "B" division finalists will be selected at large from all the smaller schools of the state.
