Miss June Anne Hunt Bride In San Francisco Rites Sunday

In a mid-afternoon ceremony Sunday, April 7, in California, Miss June Anne Hunt and Raymond E. Sousa exchanged marriage vows at the home of the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Sjdoin, 427 Guerrero street, San Francisco. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Raymond, 138 East Norton avenue, Bend.

The double-ring ceremony was performed by Rev. G. K. Millett, pastor of the Simpson Methodist church in San Francisco, in the presence of relatives and close friends. The vows were said before a white fireplace banked with pink snapdragons, roses and sweet peas. On each side of the mantel were pedestal baskets of white lilies.

The bride was given in marriage by her stepfather, D. G. Raymond, who escorted her to the improvised altar. She wore a tailored white gabardine suit with navy blue accessories and a navy blue picture hat. Her corsage was an orchid.

Miss Anita Sousa of San Francisco, sister of the groom, was maid of honor, wearing a suit of old gold with black accessories, and a corsage of roses. Victor Prodia of San Francisco acted as best man.

Following the ceremony, the groom's parents were hosts at a large reception at Mission hall, which was decorated for the occasion with a profusion of flowers. Refreshments were served from a long table, beautifully decorated and centered with a three-tiered wedding cake topped with orange blossoms and a miniature bride and groom standing under an arch of lilies-of-the-valley. Mrs. Sousa was graduated from Bend high school in 1944. For the past year and a half, she has been living in San Francisco, where she is employed by the Pacific Tankers company. Her husband was graduated from Mission high school in San Francisco in 1937, and later enlisted in the army air corps. During the war he served in the China-India-Burma theater and was awarded the silver star citation for participation in the first air raid on enemy-held China. He received his discharge last November and is now employed by the Don Lee corporation.
