

Power Strike In Pittsburgh Comes To End

(By United Press)
Settlement of the 27-day-old Pittsburgh power strike and prospects for an end to the maritime strike brightened the nationwide labor outlook despite the first major pilot's strike in the history of commercial aviation.

Pittsburgh power workers returned to their jobs yesterday pending arbitration of their dispute with the Duquesne Light Co., and ship owners agreed to meet again today with members of the striking maritime unions.

Developments Listed
In other developments on the labor front:

Union officials postponed a strike of electrical workers of the South Carolina Electric and Gas company and agreed to meet with Columbia (S. C.) city officials in an effort to settle the dispute.

Officials of the United Auto Workers (CIO) announced that the union next week would ask the automobile industry for "substantial" wage increases to meet rising living costs.

The strike of TWA pilots, which began at 4:59 a. m. (EST), was called by the Air Line Pilots Association (ALP) to enforce demands for new pay scales which would give pilots of Skymaster type planes a top monthly salary of \$1,086 and Constellation pilots \$1,187 a month.

Strike Ends
The Pittsburgh strike ended yesterday when members of the independent union of Duquesne Light Co. workers voted to return to their jobs immediately while their demands were submitted to arbitration.

Settlement of the 20-day-old maritime strike was hoped for today after union officials and ship operators agreed to meet this afternoon in an attempt to iron out two remaining differences. The negotiations said they had disposed of most of the issues in the 25 hours of meeting over the week-end.

Bridges Has Offer
On the west coast, waterfront employers prepared to discuss an offer by Harry Bridges, president of the striking Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union (CIO) to reopen negotiations if the employers would consider a separate contract for loading and

unloading 15 steam lumber schooners in coastwise trade. Walter Reuther president of the UAW-CIO, said his union would begin negotiations with Chrysler Corp. next week with a demand for wage increases "due to the quickly changing price index." He said the union would not set a definite figure but it was indicated at a meeting of the union's executive board that it would be close to 20 cents an hour.

Crew Strikes; Vessel Drifts

Bristol, England, Oct. 21 (AP)—Passengers aboard the strike-stricken British freighter Princessa today told a modern mariner's saga of drifting helplessly in the south Atlantic for days

while the ship's company fished for sharks.

The 8,731-ton Princessa reached port yesterday 22 days overdue after a 52-day voyage from Montevideo, Uruguay, with a cargo of Argentine meat. Seven West Indian firemen were taken ashore last night to be arraigned in magistrate's court for their part in the turbulent voyage.

Charges Made
The firemen were charged with "continued willful disobedience to certain lawful demands" during the voyage. Inspector N. Phillips said other charges of a more serious nature would be preferred later.

Passengers said the firemen went on a "slowdown" strike one week out of Montevideo in protest against working conditions. The ship's head of steam dwindled so much the vessel was unable to move. It was barely sufficient to keep the refrigeration working and save the meat.

Danger Of War Thought Passing

Stockholm, Oct. 21 (AP)—The danger of any real war appears to be receding, Hugh Baillie, president of the United Press, said recently in an address to the Swedish American society.

Baillie and Mrs. Baillie were honor guests at a dinner given by Count Folke Bernadotte, president of the Swedish American society and chairman of the Swedish Red Cross. Baillie's speech was made at the conclusion of two months spent travelling through most parts of Europe.

"Europe is still full of rumors of wars and frictions and pressures, but the situation is quieting down as compared to what it was when I started this trip two months ago," Baillie said. "As the delegates gather in New York for the general assembly of the United Nations and the meeting of the foreign ministers, I believe they can survey a calmer scene here in Europe. The danger of real war is, in my observation, receding. That is the situation, as it looks today. But there will probably be many another war of nerves."

Stock Held Back By Car Shortage

Portland, Ore., Oct. 21 (AP)—An estimated 1900 head of cattle, the largest salable receipts since the return of OPA controls in September, were offered north Portland livestock buyers today.

T. T. Swenson, department of agriculture market news representative, said that today's cattle salable receipts were around 800 less than for the same Monday of 1945 when 2729 head of cattle were on the market.

Bob Clark, livestock salesman, who returned today from a field trip to cattle producing section, reported that a stock car shortage prevented about 600 head of cattle from leaving Baker, North Powder, Union and LaGrande loading stations.

Clark said, "there will be far more cattle killed by northwest packers during the next few months than livestock market receipts indicate, because of direct buying, much of which may be forced by the stock car shortage."

Rains Continue Most of Week End

Almost continuous rain covered most of Central Oregon over the week-end, with Bend receiving a total of .20 of an inch of precipitation.

Rains were considerably heavier in the Sisters district it was reported. As a result of the week-end storm fire danger on the Deschutes national forest subsided and lookouts and fire guards have been called in.

Hunters, many of whom have not yet gotten their deer, took new hope with the damp week-end and moved into the woods in considerable numbers. Other hunters, however, went in quest of pheasants, some going as far as Malheur and Umatilla counties.

Merwin Funeral To Be Wednesday

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the Niswonger and Winslow chapel for Scott Merwin, 64, who died Sunday morning at the Lumberman's hospital, after an extended illness. Rev. Walter J. Brown of First Presbyterian church will be in charge of the services. The Odd Fellows lodge, of which Mr. Merwin was a member, will conduct graveside services in Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. Merwin was a native of Manistique, Mich., and had been a resident of Bend for the past 20 years. He was employed by The Shevlin-Hixon Company. He is survived by his wife, Caroline, of Bend, a sister and a brother, Ruth Marie and Ralph Merwin, both of Michigan.

No. 1 Nazi Role Assumed By Hess

Nuernberg, Oct. 21 (AP)—Rudolf Hess has taken over the No. 1 Nazi role since Hermann Goering's suicide, is showing a keen memory and is drafting plans for a "fourth reich," it was disclosed today.

Col. Burton C. Andrus, prison commander, said Hess was displaying "a keen, alert memory which he seems to enjoy showing off." Hess was in good humor despite his life prison term, he said. During the trial he acted in an eccentric manner but was ruled legally sane.

Investigation of Goering's suicide by the three-man American inquiry board was believed complete except for a laboratory test expected from U. S. army headquarters in Frankfurt tomorrow. Andrus told a press conference he could not indicate the nature of the test. He said Goering's cell was under guard to keep his belongings undisturbed. The inquiry board visited it several times.

Delay Faced
The delay in a British reply to Franz von Papen's request for permission to enter the British zone was attributed by Andrus to the legal problem whether he ever had been in British custody. He was arrested by Americans.

The allied execution commission was expected to meet Tuesday night after the American board inquiring into the suicide has studied the Frankfurt report.

In Berlin today the allied control council was to examine photographs of the 11 dead nazis and decide whether they should be published. The council may make a statement of three suicide notes left by Goering.

Hillsboro Picked For New Business

Willmer R. VanVleet, Jr., today disclosed plans to enter the dry cleaning business in Hillsboro. VanVleet was in Hillsboro over the week-end making arrangements for the beginning of construction of a 25 by 65 foot building to house the plant.

Civilian production administration approval was given on the construction last week. VanVleet is a graduate of Bend high school with the class of 1942 after which he served three years in the air corps until his discharge in 1945.
