

Battling Chinese Factions Holding New Peace Parley

Nanking, Oct. 21 (AP)—Chinese communist leaders arrived in the capital today to enter into another round of peace negotiations as a third party mediator predicted "A better than ever chance" for success.

Communist Gen. Chou En-Lai and members of his party were greeted on their arrival from Shanghai by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek. Two hours later, Chiang and Mme. Chiang took off for a four or five-day visit to Formosa.

Planned For Weeks
Well-informed Chinese sources said the visit had been planned three weeks ago and that it had no political significance. Chiang had intended to leave yesterday but stayed over another day at the request of Gen. George C. Marshall.

Chinese sources added that Chiang was prepared to return to Nanking on four hours notice if sufficient progress is made in the negotiations and that he can issue a cease fire order in Formosa if necessary.

Before leaving, Chiang held a 45-minute meeting with U. S. ambassador J. Leighton Stuart.

Discussion Held
Meanwhile, Dr. Sun Fo, president of the legislative Yuan, held a preliminary discussion with third party delegates. Purpose of the meeting was to determine whether the communists will insist on their demand that the nationalists return to the military status quo of Jan. 13 and if they will accept Chiang's eight-point proposal listing his conditions for a cease-fire proposal.

Chow agreed to take part in the negotiations despite official rejection of Chiang's offer by the communist central executive committee in Yenan. It was understood that Chiang's proposal had been approved by Gen. George C. Marshall, special American peace envoy.

U. S. ambassador John Leighton Stuart, who spent the weekend at his birthplace in Hangchow, flew back to Nanking in case the negotiators decided to reconvene his "committee of five" to discuss government reorganization.

National Guard Plans Take Shape

Washington, Oct. 21 (AP)—The first 93 units of an eventual national guard of 682,000 men have been organized by the states and approved by the war department.

Ultimately there will be about 5,000 units. The 93 represent just a start.

Mr. Butler B. Miltenberger, chief of the national guard bureau, announced today that the guard hoped to have 240,000 officers and men organized by July 1, 1947. This would compare with 300,000 in the pre-war national guard.

"M" Day Force
The army looks upon the national guard as an "M" day force that can be called quickly into action to defend the nation in support of the regular army in an emergency.

National guard units are being organized so they will be capable of defending their communities against direct airborne enemy attack until an over-all military defense can function.

The new national guard will incorporate changes in weapons of warfare brought about by scientific and technical research and development, the guard bureau said.

Plan Outlined
The present plans call for 620,000 officers and men in ground units, 60,000 in the air units and 4,000 in state headquarters detachments.

The new air national guard will consist of 72 fighter squadrons and 12 light bombardment squadrons with at least one squadron in each state. They will be equipped with the latest fighters and light bombers. Later, the army said, they will be equipped with jet-propelled planes.

The complete national guard will have about 5,000 units.

John Riis, 64, Dies in Virginia

John Riis, 64, Deschutes national forest ranger in early days and city hall reporter for the Richmond News Leader in Richmond, Va., for many years, died recently in the Virginia city. It has been learned here. Mr. Riis was the son of the late Jacob Augustus Riis, nationally known New York journalist.

Mr. Riis has been on the Richmond paper since 1922, and earlier had been with the forest service in Utah and Oregon for 12 years. His experiences became the subject of a book, "Ranger Trails."

The ranger reporter was a native of Brooklyn. Surviving are his wife and two daughters.

Mr. Riis was the victim of a heart attack.

Alaska Division Given Support

Seattle, Oct. 21 (AP)—Territorial senator Norman B. Walker of Ketchikan announced today he will propose that Alaska be divided into "south" and "north" territories to facilitate early statehood for the southern coastal section.

Walker said that the division, if approved, would put the first and third legislative districts, extending from Ketchikan to Bristol Bay, in the south territory, and the second and fourth districts in the north territory.

He said he would present his suggestion to the territorial legislature when it convenes next January.

Statehood Favored
In a recent election, residents of the proposed south territory, which have 75 per cent of Alaska's population and pay 80 per cent of its taxes, voted three to one for statehood. Residents in the other two districts opposed it two to one.

Walker said the southern districts could easily support statehood and if his proposal gains approval, he predicted that those areas would become a state within five years.

Agile Baboon Toreador Foil Charging Bull

Johannesburg, South Africa (AP)—A baboon saved four persons from being gored by an infuriated bull in the Britis district near Johannesburg.

Mrs. C. H. Combrinck, accompanied by a cattle buyer and two friends, was inspecting some cows when the bull charged them.

The party scattered and a baboon, disturbed by the uproar, leaped from a tree where it had been resting and landed in front of the bull, which immediately turned upon it.

The baboon, with the bull on its heels, suddenly leaped into another tree and the bull, unable to stop, charged headlong into the tree and broke its neck.
