

Leahy Selected As Outstanding Coach Of Week

New York, Nov. 13 (AP) — No body scored, but for his boys it was a 0 to 0 "victory" and his legion of followers all over the globe will never regard it as anything but a glorious triumph.

Personally he scorns any praise as much ado about nothing to nothing and his disappointment was as keen as if his team had been drubbed unmercifully.

Moreover, he doesn't think "the lads" will win another game all season, but if he is serious, he isn't kidding anyone but himself. He is the number one pessimist in the business, but the records show that his opponents should be the glum ones — and they invariably are at the finish.

Coach of Week

He's the United Press coach of the week, Frank Leahy of the fighting Irish of Notre Dame, who stopped Army's all-victorious three year march at 25 straight.

The great Army blanch, Glenn Davis and Felix Blackard, who had steam-rollered team after team for three seasons were kept thoroughly in check and in the end there was revenge for a Notre Dame team that had suffered humiliating 48 to 0 and 59 to 0 defeats to Army in 1945 and 1944.

Leahy kept intact his record of never yielding a point to Army in the four seasons his teams have faced the Cadets, in 1941, 1942, and 1943 before he went into the navy and this year in his first post-war season.

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Wolves, Ironmen Still Hold Leads

The Hollywood skaters shut out the Oakland Oaks last night 5 to 0, for their 11th win in 12 games. Goalie Baz Hastien took credit for the Oakland goose-egg, while five players—Blink Belling, Bill Barliko, Doc Prentice, Larry Archambault and Harold Brayshaw—shared the Wolves' scoring honors.

The Seattle sextet raced past Tacoma, 9 to 5, to boost its northern division edge to four points. The Ironmen led from the start, scoring three goals in the first period, four in the second and two in the third.

In another northern division contest the Vancouver Canucks moved into a second place tie with Portland by topping New Westminster, 6 to 5, in an overtime period. Chuck Millman scored the winning goal.

San Diego's Skyhawks held on to second place in the south section, piling up five goals in the first two periods and then holding off the Fresno Falcons for a 6 to 3 triumph. Only two two-minute penalties were called during the game.

Stiner To Coach Western Squad

Stiner of Oregon State was chosen today as head coach for the West team in the 1947 East-West All-Star game for the shrine at San Francisco, and Andy Kerr of Colgate was named again to lead the East team.

Stiner, dean of Pacific Conference coaches, replaces O. E. Hollingberry, former Washington State coach, who has retired. He will be assisted by Homer Norton of Texas A. & M. and George Sauer of Kansas. Kerr's staff will be the same as last year—Bernie Bierman of Minnesota and Beattie Feathers of North Carolina State.

Players for both squads will be chosen from among star seniors on the nation's collegiate football teams.

The game annually draws a capacity of 60,000 spectators to the New Year's day game in Kezar stadium, and all proceeds go to the Shrine's crippled children's fund.
