

Meat Now Means More Than Food, Chicago Reports

Chicago 20.—More meat to eat also means more soap to wash with, more shoes to shine, more fat to cook with and more glue with which to repair the kitchen chair.

While meat was scarce, the articles made from livestock by-products also were scarce. The leather men were worried. The soap men were worried. Housewives were not alone in worrying.

The importance of livestock by-products rest in the fact that only 55 per cent of the live weight of a steer can be sold as beef and that only 30 per cent of a hog can be sold as fresh meat.

Animal hides are most valuable by-products. In fact, the leather industry exists only because of the livestock industry.

The hide accounts for 8.6 per cent of the total return from a steer, as compared with 4.1 per cent returned from all other by-products. The return from the sheep pelt is relatively higher, amounting to 14.5 per cent, with the return from other by-products amounting to 4.1 per cent.

What A Steer Provides

Some of the by-products of a steer, and the part of the animal from which they are made:

From the hide you get glue, grease, fertilizer, plasterers' hair and hair felt.

The hoofs are used to make combs, buttons and potassium ferrocyanide.

The viscera yields tallow, dried animal food, fertilizer, grease, medicine and oleo oil.

The interior fat of the steer winds up as soap, oil, glycerin and candles.

The stomachs of hogs are used to make poplin. The thyroid and pancreatic glands of pigs, sheep and cattle are used in pharmaceutical products.

Hog hair and bristles are made into curled hair and brushes. Curled hair is sold for mattresses.

So you don't only eat livestock, you wear it, drink it, sleep on it, see by it, wash with it, cook with it, brush your hair with it, carry things in it, cheer halfbacks carrying it.

Youth Confesses He Started Fires In Western States

Fresno, Calif., Nov. 21 4P.—A youth who confessed setting fires which caused an estimated \$20,000,000 in damages said today that his "troubles" started when a skull fracture caused a "buzzing in my head."

Billy Williams, 18, was held on arson charges in connection with three Fresno fires after authorities picked him up on suspicion of burglary. Under questioning, he admitted setting at least 15 blazes from Phoenix, Ariz., to Vancouver, B. C.

Authorities were inclined to credit his story. His description of the buildings and the methods he used to set them afire tallied closely with the known facts.

One of the three Fresno fires which young Williams admitted setting destroyed \$15,000,000 worth of brandy in a government bonded liquor warehouse.

"I don't know why I did it," Williams told Fresno county district attorney James Thuesen, "but my head buzzes ever since I fractured my skull."

Williams said he was responsible for the following fires:

- A \$20,000 dance hall blaze in Kingsburg, Calif.; the Fresno Grape Exchange fire Sept. 18; the burning of a private home in the Kingsburg area; the bonded liquor warehouse fire Aug. 28; two packing house fires at Parlier, Calif., in one of which night watchman Fred Fuchs lost his life.

Other fires he said he started included a theater at Chico, Calif.; a Sacramento, Calif., lumber mill; an unidentified structure in Phoenix, Ariz.; three homes near Portland, Ore.; a grocery store at Vancouver, B. C.; a warehouse in Los Angeles; a Stockton, Calif., home; and a brush fire at Gerber, Calif.

Nippons Order General Purge

Tokyo, Nov. 21 4P.—The Japanese government today ordered a sweeping purge of ultra-nationalist and militarist sympathizers from the nation's economic and professional life.

At an extraordinary cabinet session, the government broadened the scope of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's original purge directive to strike at 418 organizations that played a prominent part in shaping Japan as a fascist country.

The purge of last January was originally intended to prevent totalitarian-minded political leaders from holding public office. A subsequent government purge recently hit at the "small fry" politicians.

Leaders of the firms listed in the latest order will have to be examined as to their qualifications for keeping their positions. However, if they were in a position of authority during the war, they will automatically be forced out.

Jazz Losing Its Hold, Band Leader Reports

Ames, Ia., 4P.—Band leader Frankie Masters believes that fast jazz and noisy stomping numbers are on the way out.

Masters, who with his band was on the Iowa State college campus to play at a pair of homecoming dances, said "Definitely, very definitely, the trend is toward sweet music."

The popular orchestra leader explained that every place his band plays the dancers like sweet music best. He said when the band blasts out with a "jump" number, the dancers either leave the floor or crowd around the bandstand to watch.

Plane Wreckage Found on Rugged California Mountain

N.Y. To Foster Arts and Science

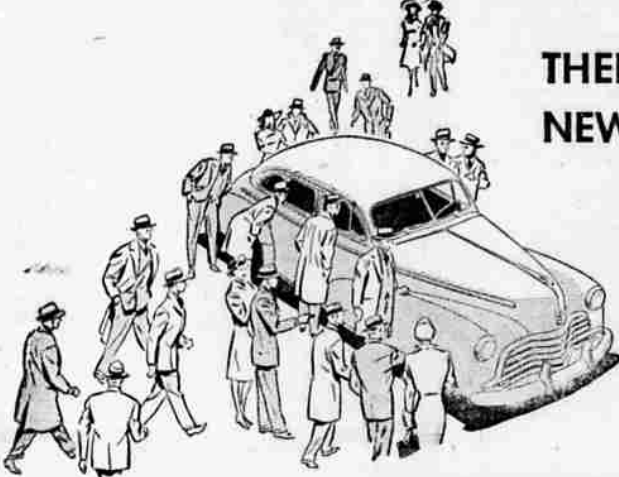
Albany, N. Y., 4P.—The New York State Education Department, realizing a long-advocated plan, has inaugurated a five-year experimental system of state institutes of Applied Arts and Sciences.

Plans for the institutes in Binghamton, Buffalo, Utica, White Plains and New York City were begun under legislation enacted early in 1946. Provisions call for a total enrollment of 3,500 students, and part-time, extension and evening courses are expected to double this figure.

Termed "a new venture in education," the institutes will offer two years of higher education to train youths as technicians in many occupational fields.

"Young people in the postwar period face a world of new inventions and technical processes, new achievements in the satisfaction of human wants and new demands for competence in citizenship, home relationships and community living," the State Board of Regents said in adding the institutes to its vast post-war education expansion program.
