Maritime Strike Not Yet Settled; Vote Being Taken

San Francisco, Nov. 21 (AP)—A secret referendum by AFL Masters, Mates and Pilots on contract proposals appeared certain today of extending the 52-day west coast maritime strike to Monday.

Capt. C. F. May, president of West Coast Local 90, expressed some doubt over the outcome of the voting. He said the employers' offer did not include the same sort of union security clause as that gained by the AFL east coast dock officers.

Pickets Show Up AFL pickets appeared along west coast waterfronts yesterday, replacing CIO pickets from the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union and the Marine Engineers' Beneficial association. Both of the CIO unions had signed agreements with employers and officially called off their strike yesterday morning.

May said it would take at least 48 hours for the referendum to be completed. He said the pickets went on duty in the meantime "to protect our interests."

Omar Hoskins, federal conciliator, said that as soon as the referendum results were known he would call union leaders and the Pacific American Shipowners' association together again, either to sign a contract or for renewed negotiations.

UN Delegate Holdup Victim In New York

Lake Success, N. Y., Nov. 21 (AP)—Dmitri Z. Manuilsky, chief Ukrainian delegate to the United Nations, charged today that the shooting of a Ukrainian delegate—an innocent bystander—during a delicatessen holdup was "a political crime."

Manuilsky, visibly upset by the shooting, told the United Press that he was making his own investigation of the shooting, and would report on it "in the proper place at the proper time."

He characterized it as "political banditry" with a political motive. Slow To Obey

The shooting occurred in a New York delicatessen shortly after midnight this morning, when two Ukrainian delegates walked into the store during a holdup.

One of the delegates, Gregory Stodnik, was shot in the right thigh and taken to a hospital. Police said the delegates were slow to obey the bandits' order for them to line up in front of a show case. The Ukrainians apparently failed to understand the order.

Billions Sought For 'War Chest'

Atlantic City, N. J., Nov. 21 (AP)—President Walter P. Reuther of the United Auto Workers today urged the CIO convention to provide a "war chest of \$2,000,000,000" to fight for new wage increases, but he failed to receive support from President Phillip Murray.

Both spoke just before unanimous adoption of a resolution calling for substantial wage increases to offset a 25 per cent loss in take home pay since April, 1945.

"I say to the employers of this nation let's fix up this national economy of ours," Murray said. "Come on, be decent; let's sit around the bargaining table and arrive at mutually satisfactory wage agreements without resort to strike."

Will Present Request "We are going to present to employers a formal request for wage increases. In so doing we are not jeopardizing our national economy. We believe that American business is now extracting enough profits from the people to enable them to make substantial wage increases without inflationary price increases."

Murray hinted that the CIO demands may amount to more than \$2,000,000,000 in wage increases.
