Japanese Quake

(Continued From Page 1) shelter to the disaster victims. Red Cross Active The Japanese Red Cross was rushing aid and had the cooperation of American Red Cross officials.

The mighty earthquake jolt came 62 miles off the Japanese coast at 4:20 a. m. today. It was felt almost immediately in dozens of cities and villages where houses collapsed and citizens rushed into the streets terrorized.

In Nara prefecture 100 houses were demolished and nine persons killed in the vicinity of the Horyu temple, believed to be the oldest wooden structure in the world. But the temple, built in 607 A. D. and housing world-famous murals, was unharmed.

Then the sea, lashed upwards by the earthquake's fury, loosed a massive wall of water on the shoreline where most of the population slept.

Cities Flooded City after city was flooded. Kochi, on the south coast of Shikoku island, and its neighboring villages on the lowlands were swept by waves seven to ten feet high which rolled five miles and more inland.

Later the coast of Honshu, on beyond Shikoku, began to be hit. Kainan, a city of 26,000, was virtually cleaned out by six successive blasts of huge waves. The tidal disturbance penetrated the Tokushima strait and entered the inland sea. The great port city of Osaka was affected, and so was Wakayama. To the west Hiroshima and Kure were hit.

Inland the quake was damaging the shrine city of Kyoto and other localities. Deaths, injuries and damage were reported from 14 prefectures.

Highway Report

Salem, Ore., Dec. 21 (AP)—Only one highway, the Alsea, remained closed today but slides, sunken grades, washouts and snow and ice continued to plague traffic in many sections of Oregon, the state highway commission reported.

Other road conditions reported at 9 a. m.: Government camp, Mt. Hood-Wapinitia highway—31 degrees; packed snow and ice from Multnomah-Clackamas county line to White school; six inches roadside snow.

Santiam pass—30 degrees; roads normal. Odell lake, Willamette highway—27 degrees; roads danded. Sun Mt. Pass, The Dalles-California highway—23 degrees; road bars; 20 inches roadside snow.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Dec. 21 (AP)—Thanks to the thoughtfulness of the students of Klamath Union high school the family of Henry V. Munday, whose home was destroyed by fire last week end, will have a merry Christmas, after all.

The students presented a Christmas gift of \$500 to Munday, hero of the blaze, who raced into his burning residence and rescued his five-year-old daughter from the flames.

The 29-year-old logger, so severely burned he had to be hospitalized, wasn't quite able to keep back the tears when the students, during an unexpected visit, handed him the money and said they hoped the gift would help make it a happier Christmas for the Munday family.

Meteor Making Attempt Failure

Los Angeles, Dec. 21 (AP)—Science's first attempt to launch man-made meteors into the earth's upper atmosphere with a German V-2 rocket was classed as a failure by Dr. James A. Van Allen, Johns Hopkins university physicist, a key figure in the experiment.

Arriving here after witnessing the firing of the rocket at White Sands proving ground, N. M., Tuesday night, Dr. Van Allen said a time device in the rocket's warhead had apparently failed and that none of the metal fragments was actually shot out from the rocket.
