London, Dec. 21 (AP)—The league against cruel sports has sent a written protest to Princess Elizabeth against her shooting a stag during her recent visit to the Invernesshire home of Lord Elphinstone, the queen's brother-in-law.

The letter, signed by Secretary J. C. Sharp, said: "Your Royal Highness: My committee greatly regrets your action in shooting a stag for sport, particularly in view of your connection with the Girl Guide movement whose sixth law states that a guide is a friend to animals. I have the honor to be your obedient servant."
